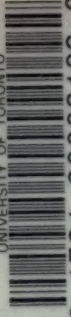


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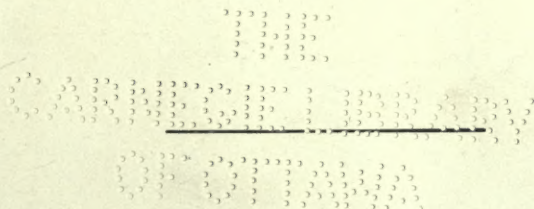

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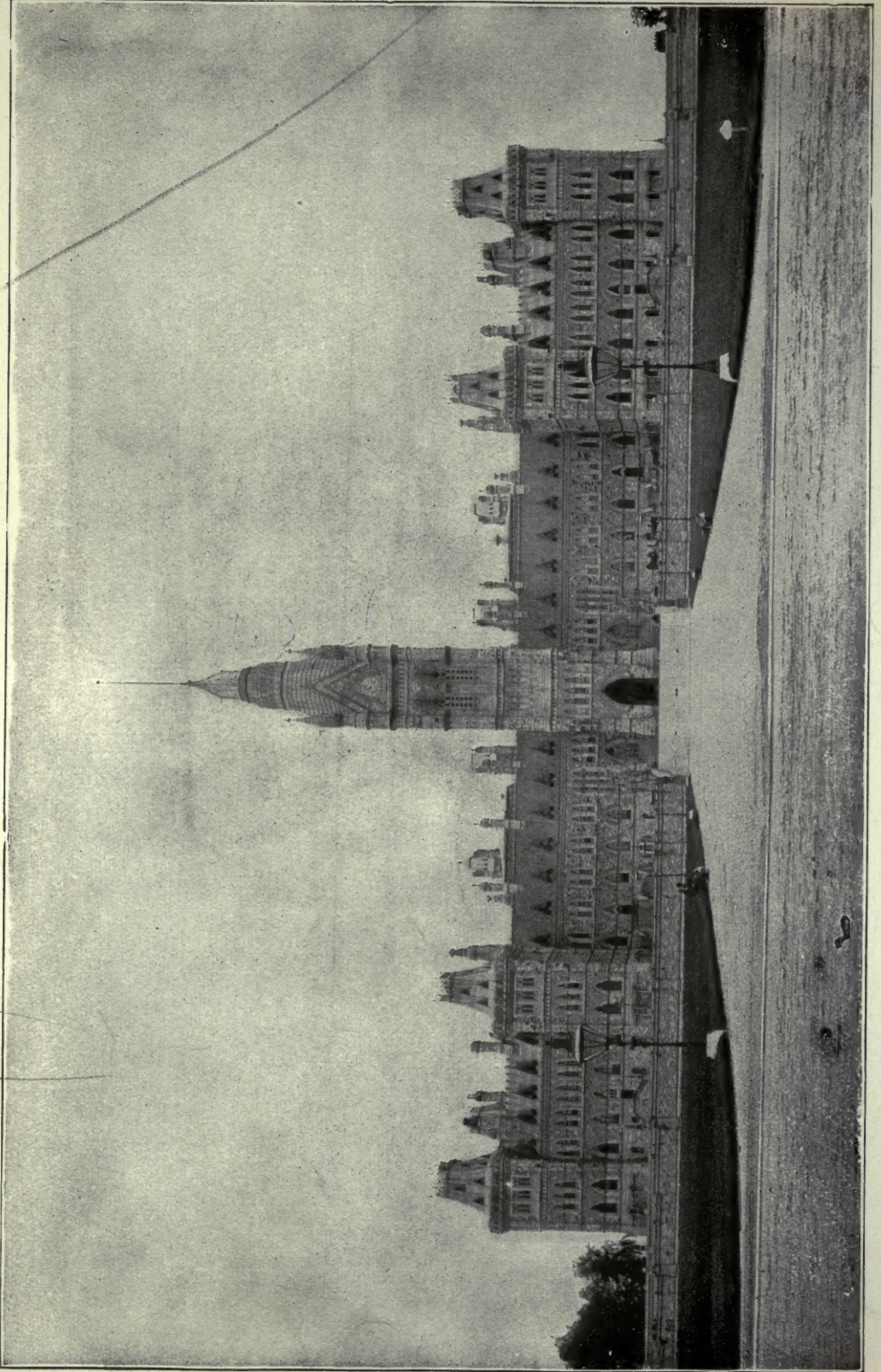
INTRODUCTION

The important place held by the Dominion of Canada in the world to-day justifies us in making such a publication.



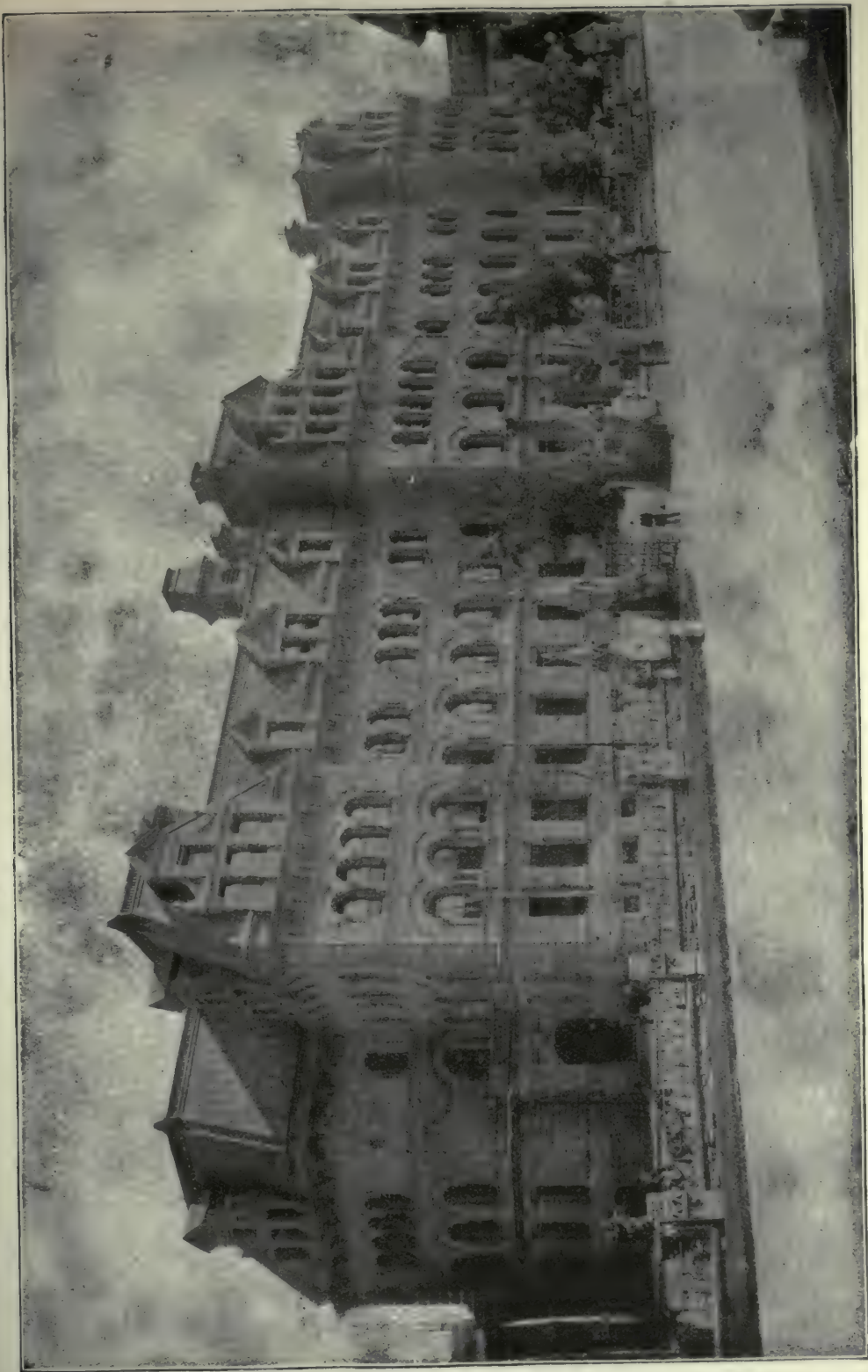
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LORD GREY.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.

His Excellency the Right Honorable Sir Albert Henry George, Earl Grey, United Kingdom (1806), Viscount Howick, Baron Grey of Howick in the County of Northumberland, (1801), and a Baronet (1746), Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, (1904), comes of a distinguished family which has been prominent in the history of Northumberland for several centuries. The first earl was a general in the American revolutionary war and the second was the celebrated Charles, Earl Grey, one of the eminent statesmen of the early part of last century. His Excellency succeeded his uncle, the third earl, on October 9, 1904. He is the son of the late general Honorable Charles Grey and his wife, Caroline, daughter of Sir Thomas Henry Farquhar, Bart. He was born on November 28, 1851, and was educated at Harrow and Trinity College, Cambridge, being graduated a senior in law and history tripos in 1873. He represented South Northumberland in the British House of Commons from 1880 to 1885 and Northumberland (Tyneside) in 1885-6. He was Administrator of Rhodesia in 1896-7 and has been a Director of the British South Africa Company since 1898. In 1899, he was appointed Lord Lieutenant of Northumberland and held that office until he was appointed Governor General. He married on June 9, 1877, Alice, third daughter of Robert Staynor Holford, M.P., of Westonbirt, County of Gloucester, and Dorchester House, Park Lane, and has one son and three daughters living: Lady Victoria Sybil Mary, born in 1878, married in 1901, to Arthur Morton Grenfell, Great Northumberland Place West., and has issue a son and a daughter; Charles Robert, Viscount Howick, (heir), born December 15, 1879, educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge, formerly a Lieutenant in the First Life Guards; Lady Sybil, born in 1882; and Lady Evelyn Alice, born in 1886. The family seal is Howick House, Lesbury, Northumberland, the London residence being 22 South Street, Park Lane W. He was appointed Governor General of Canada on September 26, 1904, landed at Halifax on December 10th, 1904, and was sworn in on the same day.—Rideau Hall.



RT. HON. SIR WILFRID LAURIER, P.C., G.C.M.G.
(Prime Minister and President of the Council.)

Wilfrid Laurier was born at St. Lin, Que., on November 20, 1841, the son of the late Carolus Laurier, P. L. S., and his wife, Marcelle Martineau. He was educated at the schools of his native village, at L'Assomption College, and at the Law Faculty of McGill University where he graduated as B. C. L. in 1864. He was called to the Bar in the same year. He was made a Q. C. in 1880. He was married on May 13, 1868, to Miss Zoe Lafontaine. In 1871, the future Premier was elected to the Legislative Assembly for Drummond and Arthabaska. He resigned to contest the same riding for the House of Commons at the general elections of 1874 and was elected. On October 8, 1877, he was sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Minister of Inland Revenue in the Mackenzie Administration, but on going back for re-election, he was defeated by D. O. Bourbeau who obtained a majority of 40 votes. Mr. I. Thibodeau, then member for Quebec-East, resigned and Hon. Mr. Laurier was elected in his place. He has been re-elected in that constituency at the general elections of 1878, 1882, 1887, 1891, 1896, 1900 and 1904. In 1896, he ran simultaneously for Quebec-East and Saskatchewan, N. W. T., and, in 1904, again for his old riding and Wright, and was elected for both seats. Sir Wilfrid has been leader of the Liberal party since 1887. After the defeat of the Tupper Administration, at the general elections of June 23, 1896, Hon. Mr. Laurier was called by Lord Aberdeen, Governor General, to form a ministry, on July 8 following, when Sir Charles Tupper resigned. He was sworn as President of the Privy Council, on the 11th of July, and formed his cabinet on the 13th of the same month. Hon. Mr. Laurier represented Canada on the occasion of the celebration of Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee at London, in June 1897, when he was created a Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George. On July 6, 1897, he was sworn of the Imperial Privy Council. On July 29, 1897, he was presented by the President of France at Havre, with the star of a Grand Officer of the Legion of Honor. While in England, Sir Wilfrid secured from Her Majesty's Government the denunciation of the German and Belgian commercial treaties which stood in the way of Canada's new tariff, extending a preference to the United Kingdom. The University of Toronto and Queen's University of Kingston, Ontario, conferred on him the honorary degree of L. L. D. Sir Wilfrid went to Washington in November 1897, in the interest of better relations between United States and Canada. He was a member of the Joint High Commission which met at Quebec on August 23, 1898, to discuss questions affecting jointly those two countries and Great Britain. In 1902, he was invited to England to attend the coronation of King Edward VII. He was present at the Colonial Trade Conference which began in London on June 30. He received the freedom of the City of Edinburgh on July 26, and, on the same day, Edinburgh University conferred on him the degree of L. L. D. On July 28, he was entertained by the City of Glasgow.—Ottawa.



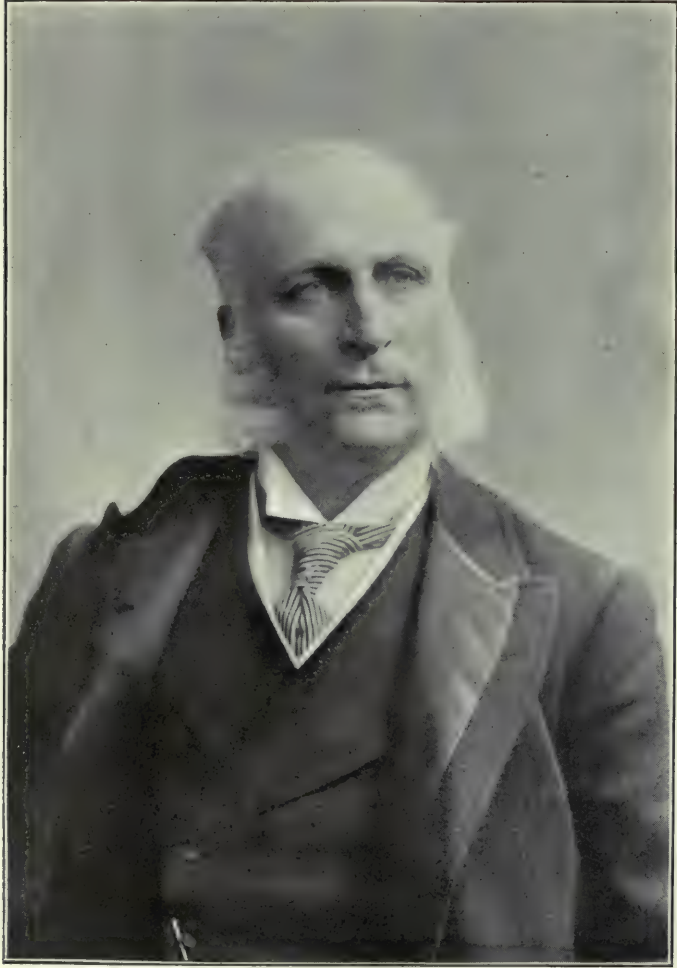
HON. SIR R. J. CARTWRIGHT, K. C. M. G.
(Minister of Trade and Commerce.)

The Right Honorable Sir Richard John Cartwright, G. C. M. G., P. C., was born at Kingston, Ont., on December 14, 1835. He is the son of the late Rev. R. D. Cartwright, chaplain to the Forces, at Kingston, and grandson of Hon. Richard Cartwright, a U. E. loyalist who was a member of the first Parliament of Upper Canada which met in 1792 and continued to sit in that body until his death, in 1815. His mother was the daughter of Conway Edward Dobbs, of Dublin, Ireland. He was educated at Trinity College, Dublin. He married, in August, 1859, Frances, eldest daughter of Alexander Lawe, H. E. I. C. S., of Cork, Ireland. He has been President of the late Commercial Bank of Canada and is now President, Master or Director of several commercial and financial corporations. He was President of the Reform Club, at Toronto, during its existence. He is the author of a pamphlet on the Militia question which appeared in 1864. He was elected to the Parliament of Old Canada for Lennox and Addington, in 1863 and sat for that constituency until 1867. From Confederation to 1878, he represented Lennox in the House of Commons. He was defeated there in 1878 but returned for Centre Huron on the resignation of Mr. Horton, the sitting member, on the 2nd of November in that same year. He was an unsuccessful candidate in Wellington County at the general elections of 1882, and was elected again at the bye-election held in December 1883 for South Huron on the resignation of Mr. J. McMillan. At the general elections of 1897, he was elected for South Oxford, and again in 1891, 1896 and 1900. He was sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Minister of Finance of Canada on November 7, 1873, which position he held until the resignation of Mr. Mackenzie's Administration in October 1878. He was created a K. C. M. G. in 1879. He was the chief financial critic of the Opposition from 1878 until 1896, when the Conservative Government was defeated, and he became Minister of Trade and Commerce in the Laurier Administration, being sworn in on July 13, 1896. On the occasion of Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee, he received the Grand Cross of the Order of St Michael and St. George. He was acting Premier of Canada in 1897, during the absence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier who represented this country at the celebration of the Queen's Jubilee. He went to Washington in 1897 to promote better terms between Canada and United States and sat at the Quebec Joint High Commission, in the summer of 1898. He is a member of the Imperial Privy Council. He was appointed to the Senate on September 30, 1904. He is a Liberal.

HON. R. W. SCOTT, Q.C., L.L.D.
(Secretary of Senate.)

The Honorable Richard William Scott was born at Prescott, Ontario, on February 24, 1825, and is the son of the late W. J. Scott, M. D., who served under Wellington in the army and came to Canada where he was appointed Registrar of the County of Grenville, Ont., and his wife, a daughter of the late Captain Allen McDonnell, formerly an officer in the King's Royal Yorkers. He was educated at Prescott by private tuition and studied law in the office of Crooks & Smith, Toronto. He was called to the Bar in 1848 and practised in Ottawa, where he was elected Mayor in 1852. He was returned to the Legislature for Ottawa at the general elections of 1857, but defeated in 1863. After Confederation, he was returned to the first Ontario Legislature for Ottawa, in 1867. He was elected Speaker of the Assembly in 1871 and became Commissioner of Crown Lands in the Blake and Mowat Administrations. Hon. Mr. Scott was Secretary of State from January 9, 1874 to October 16, 1878. He was called to the Senate on March 13, 1874. He has been Secretary of State in the Laurier Administration since 1896. He is the author of a Temperance Act known as the "Scott Act", which is still in force. He prepared and carried, in 1863, as a private member, the Separate School Law of Ontario. In 1896, he was appointed a member of the sub-committee of the Privy Council to deal with the Manitoba School question. He married Mary Ann, a daughter of the late John Heron, of Ottawa, formerly of Dublin. His eldest son, W. L. Scott, I. L. D., is Master in Chancery at Ottawa, and D'Arcy Scott, another son, is a practising barrister of the same city. Hon. Mr. Scott became Leader of the Senate of Canada, in 1902, on the retirement of the late Hon. David Mills. He is a Roman Catholic and a Liberal.—Ottawa.



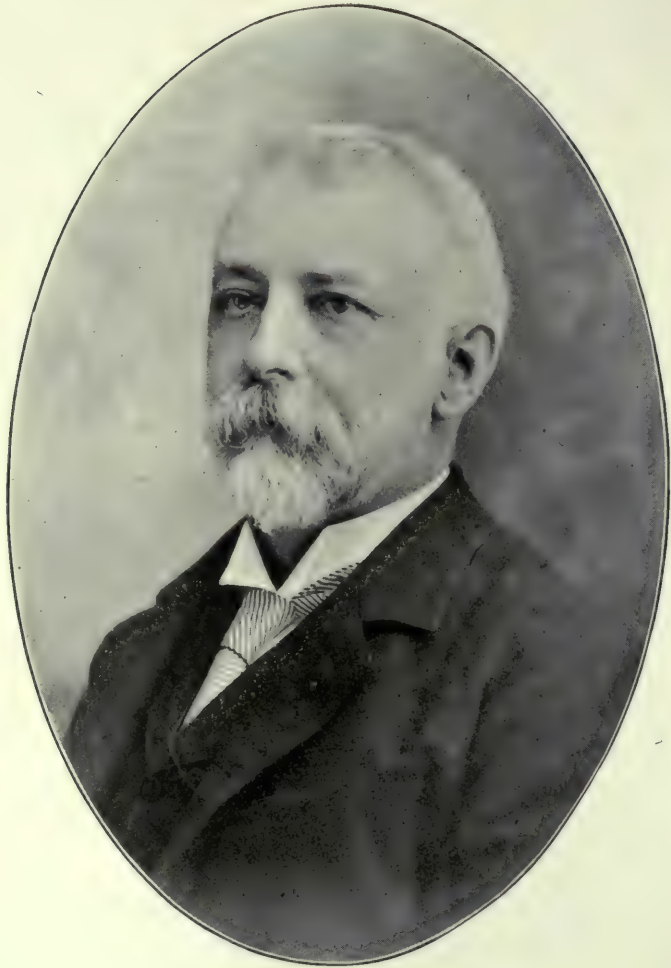
HON. SIR F. W. BORDEN K. C. M. G.
(Minister of Militia.)

The Honorable Sir Frederick Borden was born at Cornwallis, Nova Scotia, on May 4, 1847. He is the son of the late Dr. Jonathan Borden, who practised his profession in King's, his native county, for thirty years. He was educated at King's College, Windsor, in Arts, where he took the degree of A. B. in 1866; and at Harvard Medical School, Boston, in Medicine, where he graduated M. D. in 1868. He practised medicine in Canning, N. S. and was agent at that place for the Halifax Banking Company. He married first, on October 1, 1873, Julia M., daughter of J. H. Clark, of Canning, (she died), and secondly, on June 13, 1884, to Bessie B. Clark, of Canning. He was appointed Assistant Surgeon of the 68 Battalion in 1869, and, by promotion, Surgeon Lieutenant-Colonel on October 22, 1893; in 1901, he was appointed Honorary Colonel of the Army Medical Corps. He has been a member of the Provincial Board of Health of Nova Scotia since 1893. He was first returned to the House of Commons, for King's County, N. S., at the general elections of 1874; he was re-elected in 1878, but defeated in 1882, and again re-elected in 1887, 1891, 1896, 1900 and 1904. He was sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Minister of Militia in the Laurier Administration on July 13 1896. He was created a Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, on the occasion of His Majesty's coronation. In 1902, he was made a Knight of Grace of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem. Sir Frederick is a member of the Imperial Council of Defence. He is a Liberal.—Ottawa.



HON. S. A. FISHER B. A.
(Minister of Agriculture.)

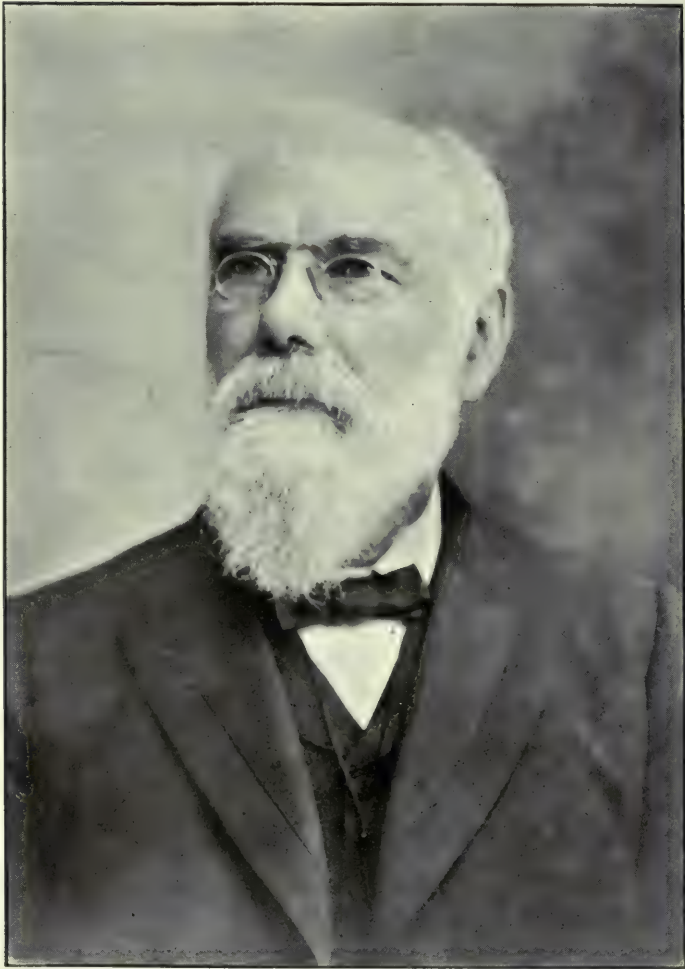
Hon. Sydney Arthur Fisher, B. A., was born in Montreal, on June 12, 1850. He is the son of Arthur Fisher, M. D., L. R. C. S., Edin., and his wife, Susanna Corse. His great-grandfather came from Dunkeld, Scotland, to Canada. Hon. Mr. Fisher was educated in the High School and McGill University, Montreal, and Trinity College, Cambridge, from which place he graduated a B. A. in 1871. He is unmarried. He always took a deep interest in agriculture and the study of science applicable to farming, dairying, and stock-raising. He is by occupation a farmer and is a J. P. for the District of Bedford. He was one of the founders of the Provincial Fruit Growers Association and the Vice-President of that body, Director of the Brome Agricultural Society, President of the Ensilage and Stock Feeding Association of Montreal and Vice-President of the Provincial Dairy Association. For a period of fifteen years, he has been a member of the Council and is also one of the Vice-Presidents for Quebec of the Dominion Alliance for the Prohibition of the Liquor Traffic. He ran unsuccessfully in Brome for the House of Commons at a bye-election held in 1880; was elected for that constituency at the general elections held in 1882 and 1887, but defeated in 1891 and elected in 1896, 1900 and 1904. At the formation of the Laurier cabinet, in 1896, he was sworn in as Minister of Agriculture and member of the Privy Council. It was he who introduced the Government measure for a plebiscite on the question of prohibition in the House of Commons, at the session of 1898. He secured from United States the removal of quarantine restrictions to the trade in cattle; he introduced the system of mechanical and chemical refrigeration on ocean steamships, and secured the passage of an Act for the Registration of Cheese Factories and Creameries, and Branding of Dairy Products, and to prevent misrepresentation as to date of manufacture of such products, and also of an Act to protect Canada against the introduction of the insect pest known as the "San Jose Scale". In 1899, he appointed a Dominion Life Stock Commissioner and an Agriculturist at the Experimental Farm to run a portion of it as a stock farm. He was also responsible for an Act respecting the incorporation of live Stock Record Associations under Federal authority and started the work of establishing Farmer Institutes and meetings all over Canada. In 1900, he passed an Act amending the Canadian copyright law, providing for granting of licences by English authors to Canadian publishers, and, during the session of 1901, an Act for marking and Inspection of Packages containing fruit for sale. Hon. Mr. Fisher instituted different measures and means for the treating and curing of cheese and tobacco and eradicating tuberculosis in cattle and, incidentally, in human beings. He created a Bureau of Public Health for the Dominion, at Ottawa. He directed the organisation and management of the Canadian section at the Paris Exhibition in 1900 and that of Liege, Belgium in 1905. He visited Japan in March and April 1903, to enquire into openings for the Canadian trade. He is an Anglican and a Liberal.—Ottawa and Knowlton.



HON. W. S. FIELDING, P. C.

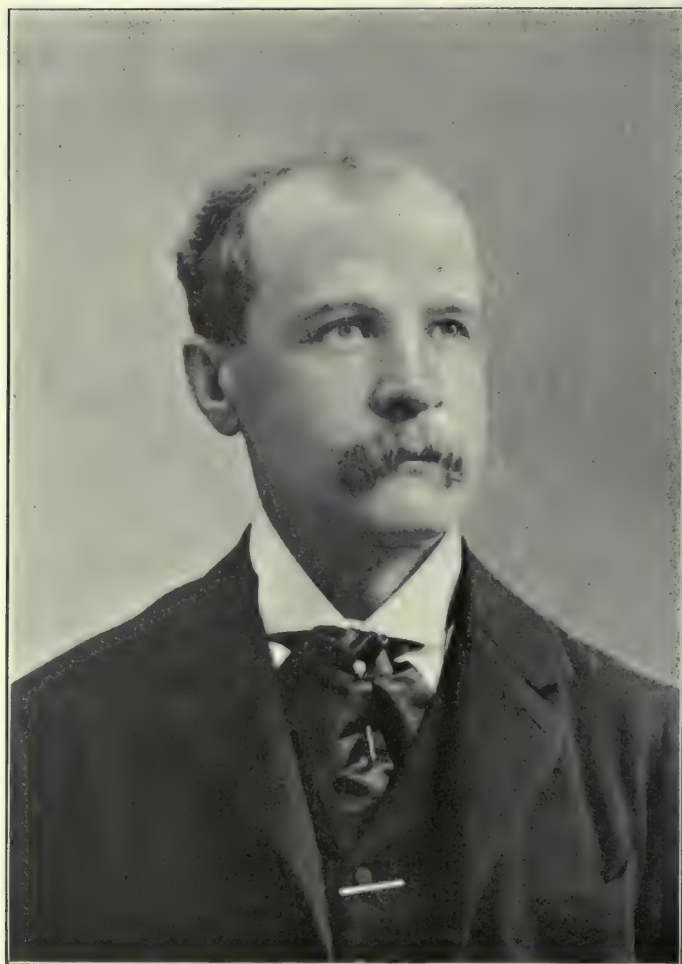
(Minister of Finance.)

Hon. William Fielding was born at Halifax, on November 24, 1848. He was educated there. He is of English descent. He was married on September 7, 1876, to Hester, daughter of Thomas A. Rankine, of St. John, N. B. He became connected with the *Morning Chronicle*, of Halifax, in 1864 and became its managing editor, from which position he resigned in 1884. He was also Nova Scotia correspondent of the *Toronto Globe*. Mr. Fielding was elected for Halifax County in the Legislature at the general elections of 1882. At the convention of the Liberal party held at Halifax after the resignation of the Thompson Government, in 1882, the positions of Premier and Provincial Secretary were tendered to and declined by him. On December 22, 1882, he entered the Pipes Administration, without portfolio. He resigned in May 1884 and became Premier and Provincial secretary on July 15, 1884, on the retirement of Hon. Mr. Pipes. He held that position until July 1896 when he was sworn of the Canadian Privy Council and became Minister of Finance in the Laurier Administration. He was first elected to the House of Commons for Shelburne and Queen's by acclamation at a bye-election held on August 5, 1896; he was re-elected at the general elections of 1900 and 1904. Hon. Mr. Fielding introduced a new preferential tariff in the House of Commons, at the session of 1897, and moved resolutions during the session of 1898 amending it so as to make it an Imperial British preference. He visited England in 1897 to float a new Canadian loan which was obtained on terms better than any ever secured before by Canada. He was one of the Canadian delegates to the Colonial Conference held in London, in the summer of 1902, and he attended the Coronation of the King. He visited Great Britain, Germany, Austria, France and Italy during the winter of 1904-05. He was then received in audience at Rome by Pope Pius X. He received the honor of a public banquet in London, England. Hon. Mr. Fielding is a Governor of Dalhousie University, Halifax, and he was for some years President of the St. George Society of that city. He is a Baptist and a Liberal.—Ottawa.



HON. WM. PATERSON,
(Minister of Customs)

The Honorable William Paterson was born in Hamilton, Ontario, on September 19, 1839. He is the son of the late James and Martha Paterson, who came to Canada from Aberdeen, Scotland, and the grandson of Rev. Mr. Paterson, of Midnar, Scotland. He was educated at Hamilton and at Caledonia, Haldimand County, by Dr. Ferrier. He removed to Brantford and became mayor of that town in 1872. He defeated Sir Francis Hinks, Minister of Finance, in South Brant, at the general elections of 1872 for the House of Commons and was re-elected in 1874, 1878, 1882, 1887 and 1891 but defeated in 1896, by 91 votes being then absent from the constituency, speaking for others during the greater part of the campaign. He entered the Laurier Administration in July 1896, as Comptroller of Customs, and, as such, he had much to do with the new customs tariff of 1897. Hon. Mr. Paterson was elected for North Grey, at a bye-election caused by the death of the sitting member by a majority of 424, on August 25, 1896. He was sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Minister of Customs, on June 30, 1897, the office of Comptroller having been abolished by Parliament. He was elected for Wentworth North and Brant at the general elections of 1900 and for the new constituency of Brant at the general elections of 1904. He was married in September 1863 to Lucy Olive, daughter of T. C. Davies, of Brantford. He was one of the Canadian delegates to the Colonial Conference at London, in June 1902. He is a member of the Farrington Independent Church and a Liberal.—Ottawa.



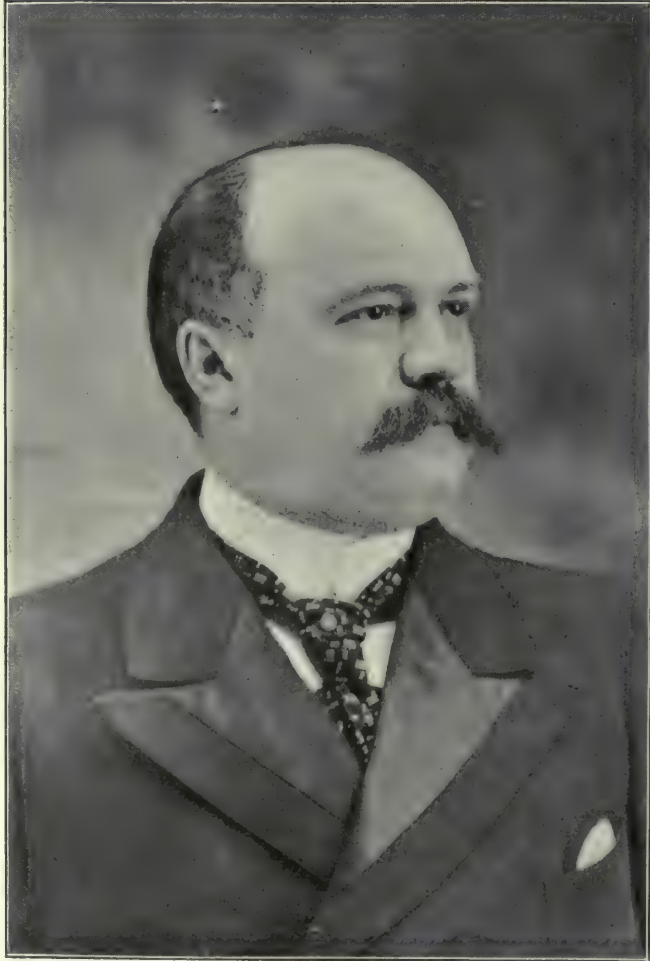
HON. C. FITZPATRICK, Q. C.
(Minister of Justice.)

Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick was born in the City of Quebec on December 19, 1853. He is the third son of John Fitzpatrick who was a lumber merchant at Quebec. He was educated at the College of St. Ann de la Pocatière, Quebec Seminary and Laval University, from which institution he was graduated a B. A. in 1873. He won the Dufferin Medal in the Quebec Laval Law Faculty in 1876. He was called to the Bar of the Province of Quebec in the same year and became a member of the firm Andrews, Caron and Fitzpatrick. He was married on May 20, 1879, to Corinne, daughter of the late R. E. Caron who was Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec at the time of his death, and sister of Hon. Sir A. P. Caron. Mr. Fitzpatrick was Crown Prosecutor for the District of Quebec at different periods, but he is best known as Counsel for the Defense in celebrated criminal cases. He was chief counsel for Louis Riel at the High Treason trial in Regina, in 1885, and he defended the late Honoré Mercier in the prosecution by the Government following the downfall of the Mercier Administration. In 1891, Mr. Fitzpatrick was offered the Attorney Generalship in the DeBoucherville cabinet, but declined. He was appointed Q. C., in 1893. He was counsel for Hon. Thomas McGreevy before the standing Committee on Privileges and Elections, in the House of Commons, in 1891. He was appointed Solicitor-General of Canada in the Laurier Administration on July 13, 1896, and he represented the Dominion before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, in England, in the case involving jurisdiction between the Provincial and Federal authorities over ownership of beds of rivers, lakes and harbors, and the fisheries. He visited England, in June 1898 as Canadian Representative in the proposed arbitration between the Governments of the United Kingdom and Russia, with reference to a compensation for the seizure of Canadian sealing schooners. Mr. Fitzpatrick was a delegate to the Irish National Convention of Dublin, in 1896. He was President of the Quebec Branch of the Irish National League and has held other positions in connections with the Irish Associations. He sat for Quebec County in the Legislative Assembly from 1890 to 1896 when he resigned and was elected to the House of Commons for the present seat. He was re-elected in 1900 and 1904. He was sworn of the Privy Council and called to the Cabinet as Minister of Justice on February 11, 1902. Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick is a Roman Catholic and a Liberal.— Quebec and Ottawa.



HON. WILLIAM TEMPLEMAN.
(Minister of Inland Revenue.)

Hon. William Templeman was born at Pakenham, Ontario, in 1845. He is of Scottish parentage. He was educated in the schools of his native place. He was married in 1869 to Miss Eva Bond, of Almonte, Ontario. He established the Almonte *Gazette* in 1867 and was for several years town clerk of Almonte and Roussag. Mr. Templeman moved to British Columbia in 1884 and became connected with the *Daily Times*, at Victoria, the first Liberal paper ever printed in that province and is now its managing editor and principal owner. He contested Victoria in the Liberal interest for the House of Commons, at the general elections of 1891, again in January 1896 and again at the general elections of 1896. He was elected President of the Liberal Association of British Columbia on its formation in October 1897. In the same year the Victoria Liberal Association unanimously recommended him for the office of Lieutenant-Governor. He was called to the Senate by Lord Aberdeen in November 1897. In religion, he is a Presbyterian. He was sworn of the Privy Council and entered the Administration of Sir Wilfrid Laurier on February 1902 without portfolio. In January 1906, he was sworn as Minister of Inland Revenue and resigned his seat in the Senate to contest Victoria City for the House of Commons. He was then elected. Ottawa.



LATE HON. R. PREFONTAINE,

The Honorable Joseph Raymond Fournier Préfontaine was born at Longueuil, Quebec, on September 16, 1850. He is the son of Toussaint Fournier Préfontaine and Ursule Lamarre, his wife. He was educated by private tuition and, in Arts, at St. Mary's College, Montreal and, in Law, at McGill University where he graduated B. C. L. in 1873. He was called to the Bar in that year. He was married on June 20, 1876, to Hermantine, daughter of the late Hon. J. B. Rolland, senator, a paper manufacturer, of Montreal. He was mayor of Hochelaga from 1879 to 1884 and subsequently became a member of the Montreal City Council. He was elected Mayor of Montreal by acclamation in 1898 and re-elected in 1900. He was President of the Young Liberals Association of Canada. He sat in the Quebec Assembly for Chambly from the general elections of 1875 to those of 1878 when he was defeated. Upon the sitting member being unseated, he was re-elected on June 26, 1879 and sat until the general elections of 1881 when he was again an unsuccessful candidate. He was first returned to the House of Commons in July 1886, upon the resignation of the sitting member, Mr. Benoit. He was re-elected in 1887 and 1891, and sat for the constituency of Maisonneuve since 1896. He was head of the firm Préfontaine, Archer, Perron & Taschereau. He ran for two constituencies at the general elections of 1900 and was elected for both, namely, Maisonneuve and Terrebonne. He was sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Minister of Marine and Fisheries on November 11, 1902. He was re-elected for Maisonneuve on December 9, 1903, by a majority of 1,869. Mr. Préfontaine died in Paris, France, on December 25, 1905, and his remains were taken to Canada on board H. M. S. Dominion. He was given a State funeral in Montreal on January 26, 1906. A Liberal.



HON. H. R. EMMERSON,
(Minister of Railways and Canals.)

Hon. Henry Robert Emmerson, was born at Maugerville, Sunbury County, N. B. on September 25, 1853 and is the son of Rev. R. H. Emmerson, Baptist clergyman, and Augusta Read, his wife. He is of English descent on his father's side and his mother's ancestors were Loyalists from the American colonies. Mr. Emmerson was educated at Amherst Academy, Mount Allison Academy, St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, N. B., and Acadia College Wolfville, N. S. He graduated L. L. B. at the Boston University and D. C. L. at Acadia College. He is a Barrister-at-Law. He was married in 1878 to Emily C. Record, daughter of the late C. B. Record, iron founder, of Moncton, N. B. (Mrs. Emmerson died in April 1901). He is a member of the senate of Acadia University, Wolfville, N. S. He first ran for the Commons in Westmorland, N. B. in 1887' but was defeated. In 1888, he was elected to the Legislature for Albert but was defeated in 1890. He was appointed to the Legislative Council of New Brunswick in 1891, and there voted for the abolition of that body. Previous to the general election of 1892, he was sworn a member of the local Administration with the Office of Minister of Public Works. He formed part of the New-Brunswick cabinets up to 1897 when, on the death of Hon. Mr. Mitchell he was called upon to form a Ministry. He became Premier of his Province in December 1897, retaining the portfolio of Public Works. He was elected to the Legislature in 1892, 1895 and 1899. Hon. Mr. Emmerson resigned the Premiership on August 31, 1900 and was elected to the House of Commons for Westmorland at the general elections of 1900. He was called to the Privy Council and appointed Minister of Railways and Canals in January 1904.—A Liberal.



HON. L. P. BRODEUR,
(Minister of Marine and Fisheries.)

Hon. Louis Philippe Brodeur was born at Belœil, P.Q., on August 21, 1862. He is the son of Toussaint Brodeur, a patriot of 1837, by Justine Lambert, his wife, whose father was killed at the battle of St. Charles. He was educated at the College of St. Hyacinthe and Laval University where he graduated LL. B. in 1884. He was called to the Bar of Quebec in the same year. Mr. Brodeur practised his profession for some years in partnership with the late Edmond Lareau, the well known litterateur, and afterwards with Mr. (now Hon.) Raoul Dandurand. He has written considerably for the press, and in 1896, became one of the editors of *Le Soir*, in Montreal. He was first elected to the House of Commons for Rouville at the general elections of 1891 and always took an active part in the debates of the House of Commons in favor of his party. Re-elected in 1896, he was, on the assembling of the new Parliament, chosen for the office of Deputy Speaker and Chairman of the Committee of the Whole. Mr. Brodeur has always been a staunch Liberal and free trader. He was elected again by a large majority in 1900 and, on the opening of that Parliament, was appointed Speaker of the House, which position he held with remarkable tact and dignity. In January 1904, he was sworn of the Privy Council and joined the Laurier administration as Minister of Inland Revenue. The legislation he subsequently introduced in the House against the tobacco trust attracted the attention of the Canadian and American press which commented very favorably upon it. After the death of Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, he became Minister of Marine and Fisheries. He was married to Emma, daughter of J. R. Brillou, Notary of Belœil.--St. Hilaire and Ottawa.



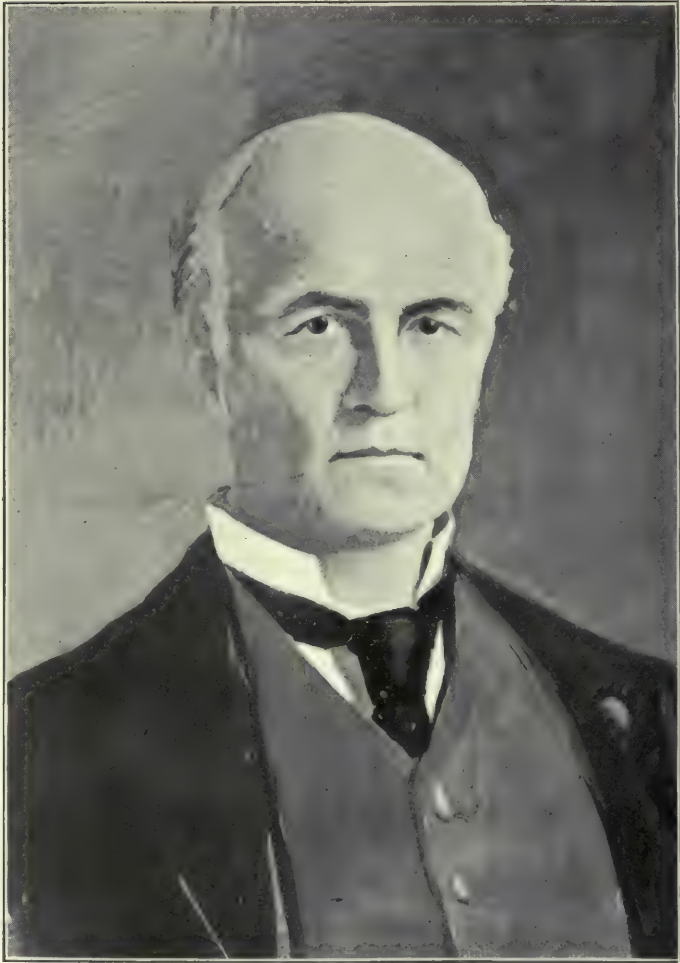
HON. CHS. S. HYMAN,
(Minister of Public Work)

Hon. Charles Smith Hyman was born at London, Ontario, in 1854. He is the son of Ellis W. Hyman who came to Canada from Pennsylvania in 1836 and Annie Niles, his wife, a daughter of the late William Niles, who represented Middlesex in the Legislative Assembly of Canada in 1854. He was educated at Hellmuth College, London. He is by occupation a manufacturer. He was married in 1876 to Elizabeth, daughter of John Birrell, of London. Hon. Mr. Hyman was alderman and chairman of the Finance Committee in London for the term of 1882-83 and mayor in 1884. He was President of the Board of Trade for 1881-82. In 1893, he was appointed secretary of the Dominion Liberal Convention. Hon. Mr. Hyman was first returned to Parliament for London at the general election of 1891. He was re-elected at the general elections of 1900 and 1904. At the session of 1903, he was selected as one of the joint committee of seven to define the boundaires of the constituencies under the Redistribution Bill. He was chairman of the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, and at the session of 1903 he presided over the protracted and important debate on the National Transcontinental Railway. He was called to the Privy Council on February 5, 1904, as minister without portfolio and he was acting Minister of Public Works during the illness of the Hon. James Sutherland. At the death of the latter, Hon. Mr. Hyman was sworn in as his successor. He is an Anglican and a Liberal.— London, Ont.



HON. F. OLIVER.
(Minister of the Interior.)

Hon. Frank Oliver, Minister of the Interior, was born in the township of Chingonacoucy, County of Peel, Ontario, in September 1853. He was educated at the Common School of his native place. He is of mixed Irish and English descent. He was married in 1881 to Harriett, daughter of Thomas Dunlop, of Prairie Grove, Manitoba. He is by profession a journalist and publishes the *Bulletin* at Edmonton, Saskatchewan, where he resides. Mr. Oliver became a member of the North West Council on May 29, 1883 and was elected to the Legislative Assembly which succeeded the Council in 1888. He sat there until June 1896, when he resigned to run as an Independent for the House of Commons; he was elected. Re-elected as a Liberal in 1900 and 1904. After the resignation of Hon. Clifford Sifton, Mr. Oliver was called to the Cabinet. He was sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Minister of the Interior in the present Administration on April 8, 1905. On April 25 following, he was re-elected in Edmonton by acclamation.—Edmonton.



HON. A. B. AYLESWORTH,
(Postmaster General.)

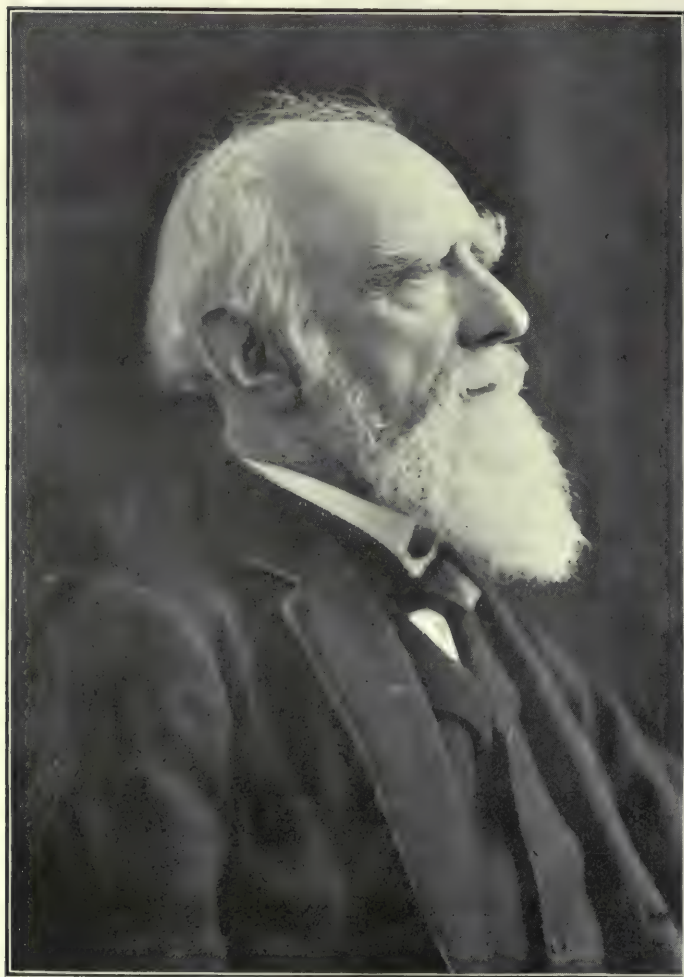
Hon. Allen Bristol Aylesworth was born at Newburgh, Ontario, on November 27, 1854. He was educated at the Newburgh High School and at Toronto University where he graduated a B. A. with the Prince's prize, in 1874, and M. A. in 1875. He was called to the Bar of Ontario in 1878. He was for some years a member of the firm Moss, Aylesworth and Armour and of that of Barwick, Aylesworth and Franks and he takes rank as the leader of the common law Bar. He was leading counsel for the Countess d'Ivry in her libel suit against the *Toronto World*, in 1897. He was created a Q. C. by the Ontario Government in 1889 and by the Earl of Derby, Governor-General of Canada, in 1890. He is a bencher of the Law Society of Upper Canada and a senator of Toronto University. In 1902, he was counsel for Mr. Brunet before the Supreme Court of Canada, in the St James (Montreal) election protest. In 1903, he was one of the Canadian representatives at the Anglo-American Alaska Conference which sat in London, Eng. Hon. Mr. Aylesworth has always been a Reformer. In religion he is a Methodist. He was sworn of the Privy Council as Minister without portfolio shortly before the general elections of 1904 but failed then to be elected in the County of Durham. He then retired from the cabinet but he re-entered it as Postmaster General and then carried the county of North York. Mr. Aylesworth was married in 1878 to Miss Adelaide Augusta, daughter of Mr. C. H. Miller.—Toronto and Ottawa.



HON. RODOLPHE LEMIEUX.

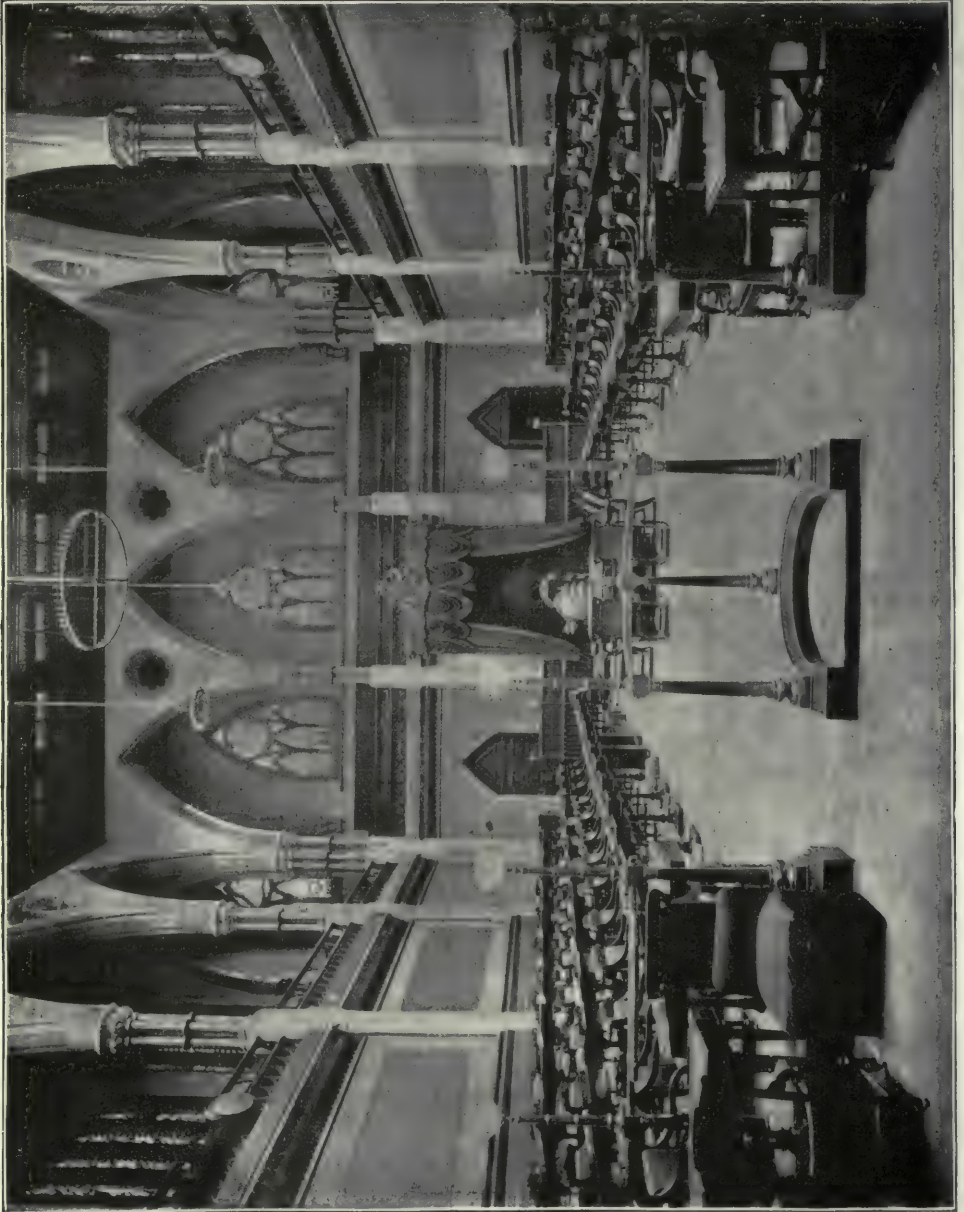
(Solicitor General.)

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux is the son of H. A. Lemieux, Inspector of Customs in the Province of Quebec. He was born in Montreal, on November 1, 1866, and was educated at the College of Nicolet and Ottawa University. He studied law at Laval University, Montreal, where he graduated LL. B. in 1891, and LL. D. in course, in 1896. He was called to the Bar, in 1891 and entered into partnership with Messrs Mercier & Gouin who both became Premier of the Province of Quebec. Mr. Lemieux was for some time assistant editor of *La Patrie*. He is the author of "La Contrainte Par Corps" a legal thesis delivered in 1896, of "Wilfrid Laurier" an address (1897), and "Les Origines du Droit Canadien" a very extensive contribution to the legal literature of this country. He has been lecturer on History of the Law at Laval University since 1897 and held for several years the office of Recorder of the town of St. Louis de Mile-End, a suburb of Montreal. He was first returned to the House of Commons for Gaspé County at the general elections of 1896; re-elected in 1900 and 1904, the last time being returned also for Nicolet. At the opening of the first Liberal session, in 1896, Mr. Lemieux seconded the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne. He was sworn in as Solicitor General on January 29, 1904. He was created a K. C. for Quebec in 1897 and for the Dominion in 1904. Hon. Mr. Lemieux is a member of the Eighty Club. He was married in May 1894, to Berthe, daughter of Hon. Sir Louis Jetté, now Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec. In March 1906, he was created by the French Government a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor. — Montreal and Ottawa.



LORD STRATHCONA AND MOUNT ROYAL.
(High Commissioner for Canada in the United Kingdom.)

Lord Strathcona, better known as Sir Donald A. Smith, was born in Morayshire, Scotland, in 1820, and educated there. He came to Canada when quite a youth and entered the service of the Hudson's Bay Company, gradually rising step by step until he attained the position of Director and afterwards President, Resident Governor and Chief Commissioner in Canada, and was elected in 1888 to the position of Governor of that Corporation. It is safe to affirm that no man living knows more of that extensive tract of country known as the North-West Territories than Lord Strathcona. He has led a busy and active life, and during his long career has been closely identified with most of the great commercial enterprises which have done so much to build up Canada, and at the present time is Honorary President of the Bank of Montreal. He represented Winnipeg and St. John in the Manitoba Assembly from the first meeting of that body in 1871, until January, 1874, when he resigned. Sat in the Commons for Selkirk on the admission of Manitoba into Confederation in 1871, and was re-elected at the general elections of 1872, 1874 and 1878, which latter, upon petition, was voided. He was returned for Montreal West in 1887, and sat continuously until Parliament was dissolved in April 1896. Sworn of the Privy Council and appointed High Commissioner April 24, 1896. Lord Strathcona's many acts of benevolence are well known. In conjunction with Lord Mount Stephen he built and endowed the Royal Victoria Hospital in the Queen's Jubilee year, 1887, and his munificent gifts to McGill College (of which he is Chancellor) has been the means of raising that institution to a foremost position among the seats of learning of this Continent. His latest gift in this connection is the building of the new "Donalda College" for the higher education of women. On the celebration of her "Diamond Jubilee," Her Majesty the Queen was graciously pleased to bestow a peerage upon Sir Donald under the title of Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal. A Liberal-Conservative.—Montreal.

THE SENATE.





HON. RAOUL DANDURAND
(Speaker of the Senate.)

Hon. Raoul Dandurand was born in Montreal, on November 4, 1861. He is the son of the late Oe Dandurand, merchant, Montreal, and of Marie Marguerite Roy. He was educated at the Montreal College and Laval University where he graduated in 1882. He was called to the Bar of the Province of Quebec in January 1883, and became a partner of the late Joseph Doutre, Q.C. Later he formed a partnership with Mr. (now Hon.) L. P. Brodeur and is still practising law as head of the firm of Dandurand, Brodeur & Boyer. Mr. Dandurand has published, conjointly with Mr. Charles Lanctôt, now Deputy Attorney General of the Province of Quebec, a treatise on criminal law and manuals for justices of the peace and police officers. He was made a K. C. in 1898. In 1891, he was created a Knight of the Legion of Honor by the French Government.

Hon. Mr. Dandurand has always been a very active Liberal and served as President of the Club National, at one time a very powerful political association which had in its ranks all the militant liberals of the Montreal district. He has had the direction of the forces of his party in all the general elections since 1890. He was called to the Senate in January 1898 and was appointed to the speakership of that body in January 1905.

He was married, in 1886, to Miss Josephine, daughter of the late Hon. F. G. Marchand.

Madame Dandurand is vice-president of the National Council of Women of Canada. She has founded and edited the first feminine literary review in Canada, "Le Coin du Feu" which appeared for over five years. She has published "Les Contes de Noel", a volume of essays, three comedies: "Rancune", "La Carte Postale" and "Le langage des Fleurs" which were played in Montreal and Quebec. She has under press another comedy "Victimes de l'Idéal", in verse. She is a frequent contributor to periodicals.

At the request of the National Council of Women, the Canadian Government appointed a Lady Commissioner to the Paris Exhibition of 1900 and Mme Dandurand was Canada's delegate. She presided in Paris over a number of meetings of the International Council of Women. She was the first Canadian woman to be honored with the decoration of "officier d'Académie" by the French Government in 1899.

She founded "L'œuvre des Livres Gratuits" in 1892, which circulates yearly many thousands of books to people in need and more specially to the female teachers in the rural parts of the Province of Quebec.



SAMUEL E. ST. ONGE CHAPLEAU,
(Clerk of the Senate.)

Mr. Samuel E. St-Onge Chapleau is the second son of the late Pierre Chapleau, Esq., of Terrebonne, Que. He was born at Syracuse, in the State of New-York, and educated at the College of Terrebonne. He went to the United States in 1860, and at the breaking out of the war, in 1861, he entered the regular army of that country, and attained the various grades of second lieutenant, first lieutenant and captain in the 16th Regiment of Infantry. He received the Brevet rank of Captain for gallant and meritorious services at the battle of Murfreesboro, Tennessee, and Brevet Major, for gallant services during the Atlanta campaign and at the battle of Johnsboro, Georgia. He was also at the battle of Shiloh, Tenn., the siege of Corinth, Miss., at Chickamanga and at Chettanooga, Tenn. He was sent to Memphis in 1866, during the riots in that city, and in October, 1868, was in command of the troops in Augusta, Ga., during the riot which took place between the white and colored population, on the occasion of the first election of President Grant. He retired from the Army in January 1871. He came back to Canada, and in 1873, he entered the Civil Service; he resigned in 1879. In 1883, he was appointed sheriff of the North West Territories which position he held until 1887, when the office was abolished. He was appointed Clerk of the Court of Chancery on December 26, 1887, and Clerk of the Senate in 1897.

Hon. George Thomas Baird was born at Andover, N. B., on November 3, 1847. He was educated at the Carleton County Grammar School. He is a lumber and general merchant. He was married on November 12, 1847, to Ida J. Sadler, of St. John N. B.

Mr. Baird was a Superior School teacher at Andover for four years. He was first elected to the Local Legislature of New-Brunswick in 1884 and

sat there until 1891 when he was appointed to the Legislative Council. That House being abolished in 1893, he was again elected to the Legislature and remained there until 1895 when he was appointed to the Senate.

In religion, Hon. Mr. Baird is an Episcopalian, in politics, he is a Conservative.—Perth Centre, N. B.

Hon. George Bernard Baker was born at Dunharm, Que., on January 26, 1834, and is the third son of the late William Baker, who represented Missisquoi in the Lower Canada Assembly from 1834 to 1837.

He was educated at the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, graduating in 1855.

He is a trustee of the University of Bishop's College. He was married in 1860 to Jane Percival, eldest daughter of Peter Cowan, of Cowansville.

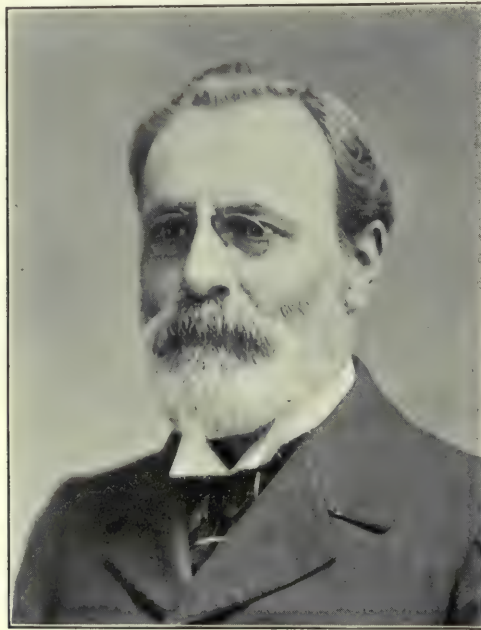
He was appointed a member of the Quebec Executive Council as Solicitor General on January 27, 1876, and held that portfolio until March 12, 1878.

Hon. Mr. Baker was first elected to the House of Commons at the general elections of 1878, he was re-elected in 1882, defeated in 1887, and at a bye-election in 1888, but re-elected in 1891. He sat in the House until January 7, 1896, when he was appointed to the Senate. He is a Conservative—Sweetsburg, Que.

Hon. Mr. Beique was born at St. Mathias, Que, in May 1845. He is the son of Louis Beique, Esq. He was educated at the College of Marieville, Que. He was called to the Bar in 1868 and created Q. C. by the Quebec Cabinet in 1885 and by the Canadian Government in 1889. He was married in 1875 to Caroline Angelina, only daughter of the late L. A. Dessaulles, member of the Quebec Legislative Council.

Hon. Mr. Beique is connected with several financial companies and was counsel in many leading cases of general interest.

He represented the Dominion of Canada before the Behring Sea

Commission in 1886. He was bâtonnier of the Montreal Bar from 1891 to 1893.

In 1900, Laval University conferred the degree of L. L. D. to Hon. Mr. Beique, as a testimony to his legal attainments.

In 1906, he acted for the Delaware and Hudson Railway Company before the Court of the Exchequer Court where he purchased for his client the South Shore Railway, at a price over \$1,000,000.

Hon. Mr. Beique is President of the "Compagnie de Publication du "Canada" which publishes the liberal organ of the District of Montreal.—Montreal.

Hon. Thomas Alfred Bernier was born at St. George de Henryville, Iberville Co., Que., on August 15, 1844. He is the son of the late Thomas Bernier and Julie Letourneau, his wife. He was educated at the College of St Hyacinth. He is a member of the Bar of the Province of Quebec and an attorney in Manitoba. He practised his profession at St. Johns, Iberville, where he held the office of Crown Prosecutor for a few years. He was married on August 15, 1871, to Malvina Julie, daughter of A. T. Demers, merchant of Henryville. Hon. Mr. Bernier removed to Manitoba in 1880 and, in 1881, he was appointed French Superintendent of Public Instruction in that Province, which position he held until 1890 when it was abolished by the Statute which revised the famous Manitoba School Question. He published in 1887 a booklet intituled "Manitoba, Champ d'Immigration",

the object of which was to promote western colonization amongst French-Canadians. He was Registrar of the University of Manitoba from 1881 to 1893. He is a member of the Executive Committee of the Provincial Agricultural Board, and has been Chairman of the Eastern Judicial District Board. He has been Mayor of St. Boniface, Commissioner to revise the municipal law, also Commissioner to enquire into the working of the law in connection with the sale of half breeds lands' and president of various societies. He is a frequent contributor to *La Revue Canadienne*. Hon. Mr. Bernier was appointed to the Senate in October, 1892. He has belonged so far to the Conservative party. He is a Roman Catholic.—St. Boniface, Man.

Hon. Joseph Bolduc was born at St. François de la Beauce, on June 22, 1847. He is the son of Captain A. Bolduc, a descendant of Louis Bolduc, who came to Canada as the Procureur du Roi, in 1668.

He was educated at Ste-Marie College and Laval University. He was married in October, 1873, to Miss M. G. A. Mathieu at St. François. He is engaged in business as a lumber merchant and a notary by profession.

Hon. Mr. Bolduc has been Warden of the County of Beauce and Mayor of the parish in which he resides; President of the School Trustees, Direc-

tor of the County Agricultural Association and of the Levis and Kennebec Railway. He has been successful in promoting the Tring and Megantic Railway, which is the shortest route between Levis and the Maritime Provinces and New England.

He was elected to the House of Commons in 1876 to represent Beauce and sat there to October 1884, when he was called to the Senate. He is a Conservative.—St. Victor de Tring.

Hon. Hewitt Bostock was born on May 31, 1844, at the Hermitage, Walton Heath, Epsom, England. He is the son of Samuel Bostock, a member of the London Stock Exchange. He was educated by private trustees at Brighton and Gilford. He entered Trinity College in 1882 and graduated in 1885 with honors.

Hon. Mr. Bostock was called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn, in 1888. He was married on June 12, 1890, to Lizzie Jane McConnie, youngest daughter

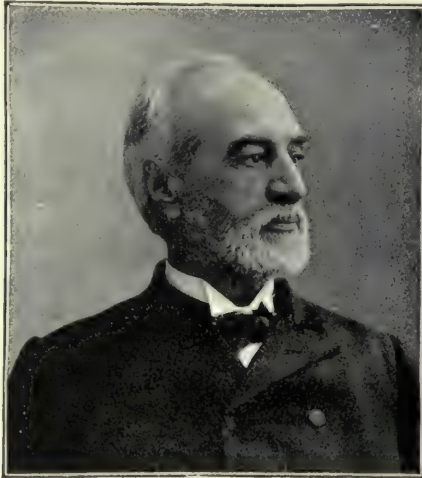
of Hugh Comie, Esq., Q. C., of Ithandale, Wimbledon, Surrey, Chancellor of the Diocese of Durham.

He settled in British Columbia in October 1893 and is engaged in ranching. He is also proprietor of "The Province", a weekly journal. He was elected to the House of Commons at the general elections of 1886. He was called to the Senate on June 6, 1904. He belongs to the Church of England and is a Liberal.—Victoria, B.C.

Hon. Charles Eugène Boucher de Boucherville was born at Boucherville, Que., on May 22, 1822. He is the son of the late Hon. P. Boucher de Boucherville. He was educated at St. Sulpice College, Montreal, and studied medicine in Paris where he graduated M. D. in 1843.

He was first married to Suzanne, daughter of R. L. Morrough, Esq., of Montreal, and, secondly, to Miss C. Lussier, of Varennes.

Hon. Mr. de Boucherville sat for Chambly in the Quebec Assembly from 1861 until the Union. Together with being a Senator, he is a member of the Legislative Council where he was called at Confederation.

He became Premier, Secretary, Registrar and Minister of Public Instruction in September 1874; in January 1876, he moved to the Department of Agriculture and Public Works.

In 1878, he and his Cabinet were dismissed by Lieutenant-Governor Letellier de St-Just. In December 1891, he was again made Premier and continued in that office until December, 1892, when he resigned. He was created a C. M. G. in May 1894.

He was called to the Senate in February 1879. A Conservative,— Boucherville, Que.

Hon. Sir Mackenzie Bowell was born at Rickingham, Suffolk, England, on December 27, 1823. He came to Canada with his parents in 1833. He was married in December 1847, to Harriett Louisa, daughter of the late J. G. Moore, Esq., of Belleville. He served on the frontier during the American Rebellion in 1864 as Major in the 49th Battalion of Volunteer Rifles, and, in 1866, during the Fenian troubles. He retired as Lieutenant Colonel.

He owned and edited the Belleville "Daily and Weekly Intelligence" for a long period and has been President of the Ontario Press Association. He was special Commissioner to Australia in 1893 for the promotion of closer trade relations with Canada; Chairman of the Colonial Conference held at Ottawa in 1894, and Commissioner for Canada in the Pacific Cable

Conference held in London, 1896. He became Minister of Customs on October 19, 1878, a portfolio he held until January 24, 1892, when he was transferred to the Department of Militia and Defence where he continued until November 24, 1892. He was Leader for the Government in the Senate at the death of Sir John Thompson when he formed a Cabinet and became President of the Council, December 21, 1894. He resigned April 27, 1896.

He was created a K. C. M. G. on January 1, 1895.

Sir Mackenzie led the Conservative Party in the Senate up to April 16, 1906, when he resigned. He sat in the House of Commons from 1867 to 1892 when he resigned and was called to the Senate.—Belleville. Ont.

Hon. Sir John Carling was born in London, Middlesex County, on January 23, 1828. He is the youngest son of the late Thomas Carling, of London. He was educated at the common schools. He married a daughter of the late Henry Dalton, of London, Ont., on September 4, 1849.

He is President of the firm of Carling & Co., brewers. He sat in the London City Council from 1854 to 1858 and represented London in the old Parliament of Upper and Lower Canada from 1857 to 1867. He was a member of the Government as Receiver-General in 1862; Commissioner of Agriculture and Public Works from 1867 to 1871 and held a seat in the

Legislature until 1872. He sat in the Commons from 1867 to 1874 and was re-elected in 1878. He was Postmaster-General and member of the Privy Council from 1882 to 1885 when he became Minister of Agriculture and continued so until 1892.

He was called to the Senate April 27, 1891, but resigned in 1892, when he was re-elected to the Commons and sat there until 1896, when he was again appointed a Senator.

He was created a K.C.M.G. in 1893, and is a Liberal-Conservative.—
London, Ont.

Hon. Charles Eusèbe Casgrain is the son of Hon. C. E. Casgrain and Anne Elizabeth, daughter of the late Hon. Jacques Baby. He was born at Quebec on August 3, 1825, and was educated at the College of Ste Anne de la Pocatière and McGill University where he graduated in 1851 as M.D., C.M. He soon removed to Detroit where he practised his profession up to 1856 when, at the request of prominent citizens, he settled in Windsor. He was

In religion he is a Roman Catholic. He was called to the Senate in 1887. He belongs to the Liberal-Conservative party.—Windsor.

Hon. J. P. B. Casgrain was born at Quebec on March 1, 1856. He is the son of Mr. P. B. Casgrain, K.C., ex-M.P., and Mathilde Parent; grandson of the late Lieut.-Col. C. E. Casgrain who sat for Cornwallis in the Legislative Assembly from 1830 to 1834, and great grandson of Hon. James Baby at one time Speaker of the Legislative Council of Upper-Canada.

He was educated at the Seminary of Quebec. He is a Civil Engineer and Dominion, Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba Land Surveyor. He was

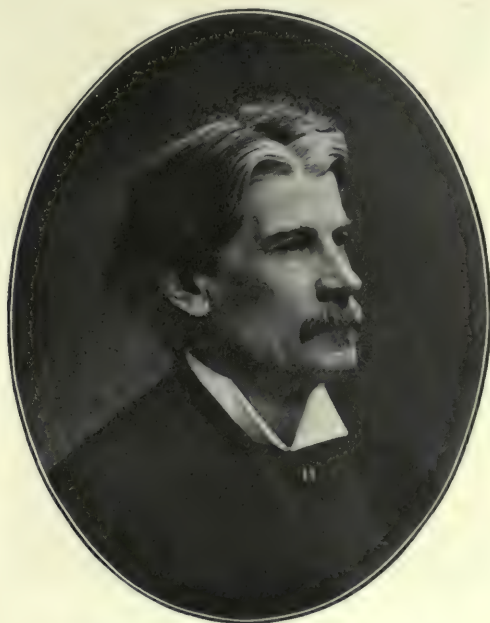
married to Ella, daughter of the late James William Cook, M.P., Dundas, Ont., on May 27, 1885.

He was called to the Senate on January 27, 1900. Hon. Mr. Casgrain is a Member of the Ottawa Improvement Commission, and Chairman of Senate Committee on Railways. He is a Liberal.—Montreal.

Hon. Philippe Auguste Choquette was born at Belœil, County of Verchères, on January 1, 1854. He was educated at the Seminary of St. Hyacinth, and Laval University. He is a Barrister. He was married on August 26, 1883, to Miss Marie, daughter of A. Bender, Prothonotary of the Superior Court at Montmagny and grand-daughter of the late Sir Etienne Pascal Taché.

He was first returned to the House of Commons for Montmagny in 1887; re-elected in 1891 and 1896. He was appointed a Puisné Judge of the Superior Court of the Province of Quebec for the District of Arthabaska

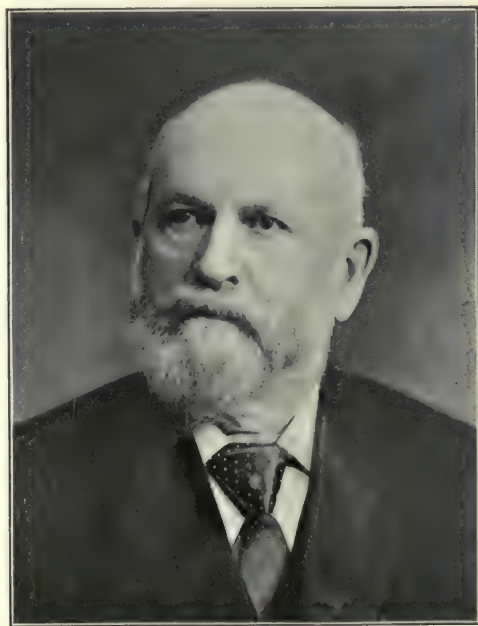
in July 1898 and resigned in September 1904, when he was called to the Senate.

He was a school teacher for over ten years and then he started in business as a merchant. He was in active politics from 1872 to 1902. He was first elected to the House of Commons in 1872 for Lunenburg; defeated in 1878. He ran in 1882 for the Local Legislature and sat there until 1902 when he was called to the Senate. Hon. Mr. Church was Provincial Secretary of Nova Scotia for two years in the Pipes Administration, and

Hon. Henry Joseph Cloran was born at Montreal on May 8, 1855. He is the son of Henry Cloran and Ann Kennedy, both native of Ireland. He was educated at Montreal College, St. Sulpice Seminary, Paris, and McGill and Laval University, Montreal. He graduated a B.C.L. at McGill and was called to the Bar of the Province of Quebec.

He was Chief Editor of the "True Witness", Montreal.

He was married October 9, 1882, to Agnes M. Donovan who died August 9, 1896.

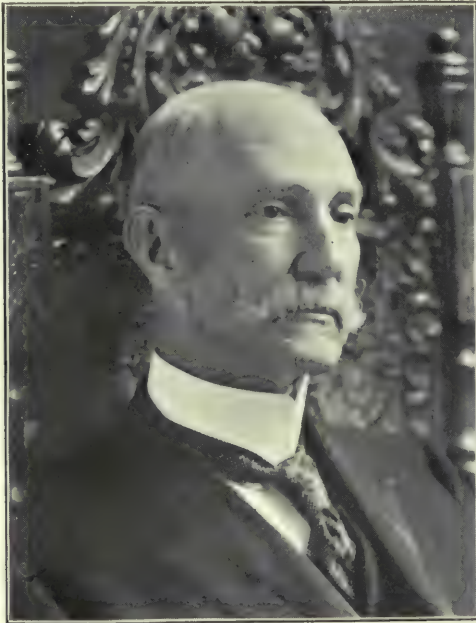

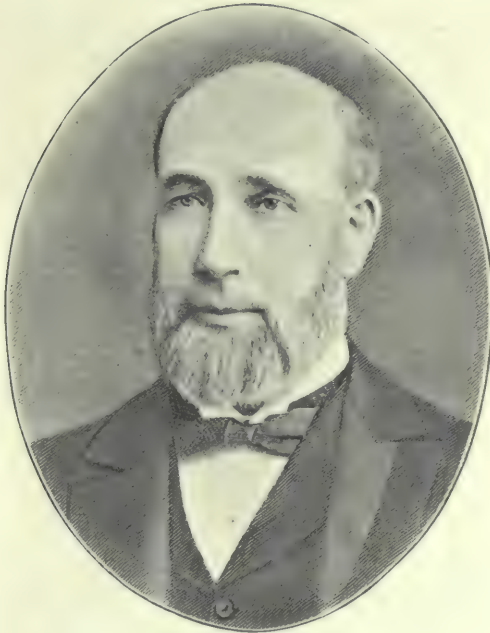

He was married in May, 1862, to the second daughter of the late Daniel Hopkins of Peterborough. She died in 1905. He was actively engaged in the life and fire insurance business after 1858 and, in 1871, he was appointed President and General Manager of the Midland Railway of Canada, which position he held until the road became part of the G.T.R., in 1884. Hon. Mr. Cox is now President of: The Canadian Bank of Commerce, The Central Canada Loan and Savings Company, the Western

Assurance Company, the British American Assurance Company, the Canada Life Assurance Company, the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company, and the Toronto Savings and Loan Company. He is a Bursar of Victoria University, Toronto, and a member of the Senate of the University of Toronto. He was Mayor of Peterborough for several years. In 1871, Mr. Cox was elected for West Peterborough in the House of Commons, but the election being declared void, a new one was held and he was defeated by a majority of one. He ran unsuccessfully for the same riding at the general election in 1887. He was called to the Senate on November 13, 1896. He is a Methodist and a Liberal.—Toronto.

Hon. Laurent Olivier David was born at Sault-au-Recollet near Montreal, on March 24, 1840. He was educated at the Sainte-Therese College. He was admitted to the Bar of the Province of Quebec in 1864. He practised law with Mr. Mousseau, late Prime Minister of the Province of Quebec. Together with Mr. Mousseau he assisted to establish "L'Opinion Publique", a weekly newspaper which he edited for a few years. In 1874, he joined Mr. Beausoleil, M. P., in founding "Le bien Public." He also founded "La Tribune." He was translator and assistant clerk of votes and deliberations of the House of Commons during the Mackenzie regime. He unsuccessfully contested Hochelaga for the Local Legislature in 1867 and 1875 and, in 1878, for the House of Commons. He was elected to the Local Legislature in 1887 for Montreal-East, defeating Hon. L. O. Taillon. He was appointed City Clerk of Montreal in 1892.

He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada.

Up to Confederation, he belonged to the Conservative party and has been a member of the Liberal party ever since.

He was called to the Senate on June 19, 1903.—Montreal.

Hon. Thomas Osborne Davis was born at Sherrington, Que., on August 16, 1856. He is the son of Samuel Davis who emigrated from Ireland in 1830 and settled in Quebec Province where he worked as a teacher. Hon. Mr. Davis was educated by his own father. About eighteen years ago, he moved to the North-West and pushed himself forward until he became a very successful merchant and rancher. In 1885, he was married to Rebecca Bond Jennings, a daughter of Richard Jennings, of Dublin, Ireland. He

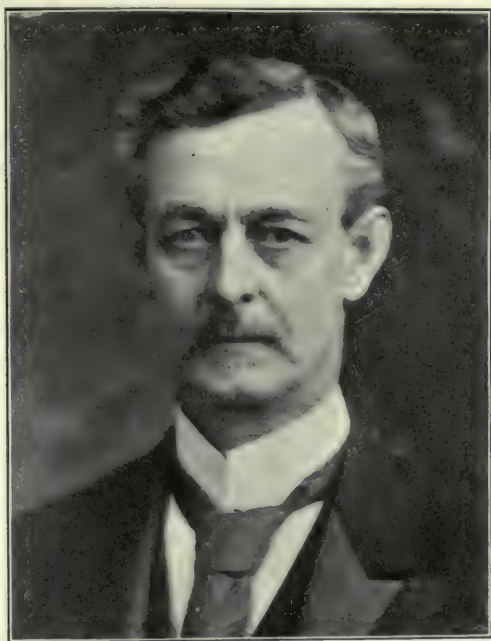
Hon. Mr. Dobson has been President of the South Victoria Agricultural Society and Chairman of the School Board for several years.

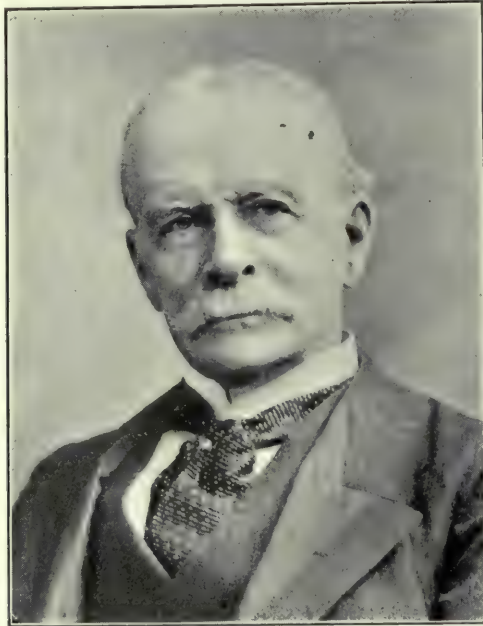

He was married in 1864 at Fredericton, N.B., to Mary Caroline, daughter of the late Samuel Babbitt, Esq.

Hon. Mr. Ellis is a journalist, being editor of the St. John "Daily Globe".

He held the position of Postmaster of St. John for a short period.

He sat in the New-Brunswick Assembly from 1882 to 1887, when he resigned to contest St. John City for the House of Commons, at the general elections of that year. He was then defeated. In 1891, he was again unsuccessful, but elected in 1891 and re-elected in 1896.

Hon. Donald Ferguson was born at Marshfield, P.E.I., in 1839. He was educated at Public Schools and by private tuition. He is a farmer but not now in active business. He was married on March 28, 1873, to Miss Scott, of Charlottetown. Hon. Mr. Ferguson is a J.P. since 1871 and sat in the Legislature of Prince-Edward Island from 1879 to 1890. In 1879, he

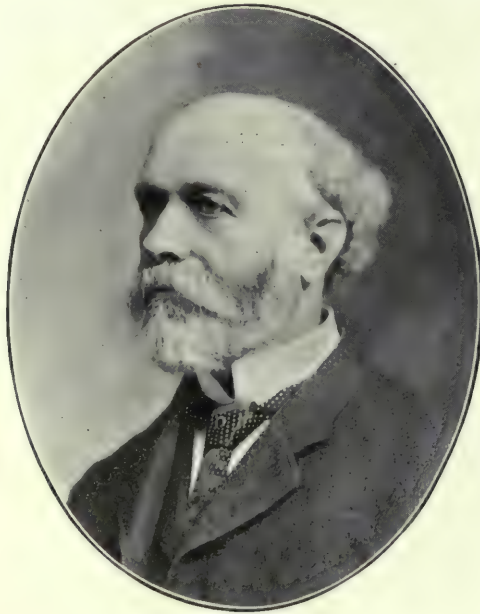

Hon. Mr. Forget is in business as a banker and stock broker.

He is President of the Montreal Street Railway Company and was for a few years President of the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company

Hon. George Taylor Fulford was born in Brockville, Ontario, on August 8, 1852. He was the son of Hiram and Martha Harris Fulford. His ancestors were originally of Great Fulford, Devonshire, England, and he is of United Empire Loyalist stock.

He was educated at Brockville, Ontario. He was married on January 20, 1880, to Mary Wilder White, daughter of Dr. Henry Orne White, of Fort Atkinson, Wisconsin.

He was a member of the Brockville Town Council for 12 years and Chairman of the Finance Committee for ten years. He was also a Water Commissioner. He was a Manufacturing chemist with depots at

(she died on February 11, 1902), and, secondly, on August 9, 1904, to Miss Margaret E. daughter of the late Alexander Mackie, Esq., of Peterhead, Scotland.

Hon. Mr. Gibson came to Canada in 1870 and entered the service of the old Great Western Railway. He is an associate member of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers and a Railway contractor. He has been engaged in a large number of important Public Works, including the masonry of both ends of the St. Clair Tunnel, the enlargement of the New Welland Canal on section J. near Thorold, Ontario, and the new Victoria Bridge, at Montreal.

He owns and operates two of the most extensive limestone quarries in Canada, near Beamsville and at Crookston.

He was Grand Master of the Freemason Grand Lodge of Canada from 1896 to 1898; was first Grand Principal of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Canada for two years; is now Supreme Grand Master of the Sovereign Great Priory of the Council for the Dominion of Canada; 33 A & A, Scottish Rite Masonry; Foreign Representative of the Grand Lodge of Quebec and Representative of the several grades near the several Grand Bodies in Canada.

He is President of the Bank of Hamilton, Director of the Canada Life Assurance Company, of the Hamilton Provident and Loan Society, the Hamilton Gaslight Company, the Keewatin Manufacturing and Lumber Company and the Keewatin Power Company.

He was first returned to the House of Commons at the general elections of 1891 for Lincoln and Niagara; unseated but re-elected at a bye-election on January 28, 1892, and again at the general elections of 1896; defeated at those of 1900. He was Chairman of the joint committee on printing from the House of Commons and holds the same position in the Senate. He was chief liberal whip in the House of Commons.

He was called to the Senate on February 11, 1902. He is a Presbyterian and a Liberal.—Beamsville, Ont.

Hon. Joseph Godbout was born at Saint-Vital de Lambton, County of Beauce. He is the son of Joseph Godbout, farmer, who was a descendant of the pioneer settler in Saint-Vital.

He was educated at the Quebec Seminary and Laval University where he graduated, 1877, in medicine. Subsequently, he removed to Saint-François de Beauce, where he has followed his profession ever since.

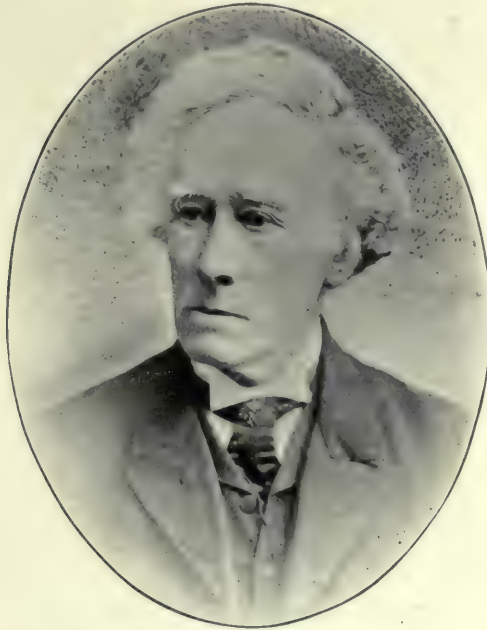

He came to Canada in 1832 and served as a volunteer in the rebellion of 1837. He was called to the Bar in 1839. He was married in 1854 to Ann, daughter of the Rev. S. B. Ardagh, A. M. In 1843, he was appointed County Judge of Simcoe which position he held until 1883. In 1869, he was appointed Chairman of the Board of Judges of Ontario.

In 1844 he was appointed by the Crown Chairman of the Board of Public Instruction of Simcoe County, which office he held until 1871, when the system was changed. In 1858, he was one of three judges framing rules under law assimilating Probate and Administration to that of England;

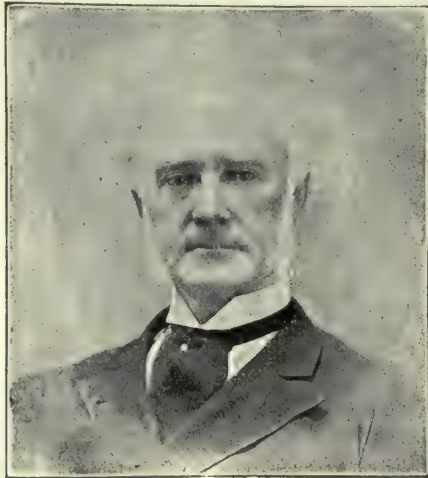
He is an LL.D. of Queen's University and a Fellow of the Imperial Institute.

He was Mayor of Montreal during 1876 and 1877 and, during his mayoralty, he organized the Local and Provincial Boards of Health.

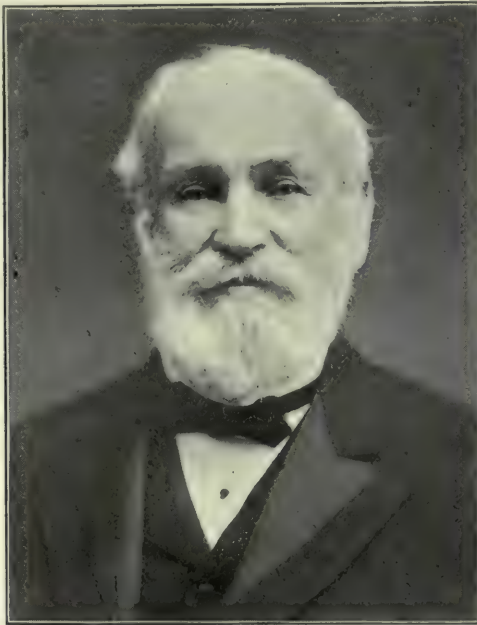
He has long been Director and is now President of the Montreal City and District Saving's Bank.

Hon. Robert Jaffrey was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1831. He started to earn his living as a grocer's apprentice, for J. R. Dymock in his native place. Five years later he was a partner, and the year following, Mr. Smith decided to give his whole time to his other interests, and Mr. Jaffrey took over the entire business.

He was one of the organizers of the Land Security Company, and as associate with him in that company was Hon. Alexander Mackenzie. The leader appointed him as a Director of the Northern Railway and in that capacity he had the Government institute an inquiry into the affairs of the

He was re-elected Mayor in 1888.

He became Provincial Treasurer in the Greenway Government in 1888 and member for the County of Shoal Lake. He then negotiated in London the first Provincial loan of \$1,500,000 to build railways to Winnipeg,

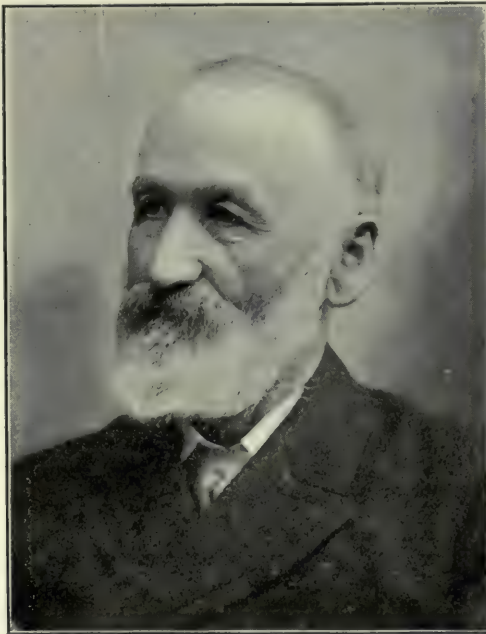

Hon. Mr. Lovitt is a Director of the Bank of Yarmouth.

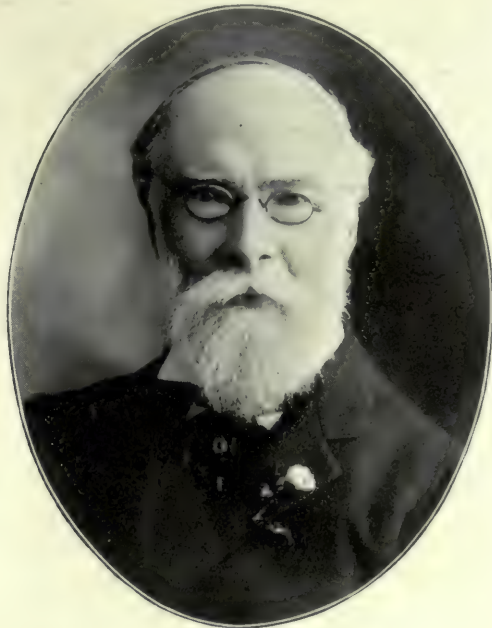

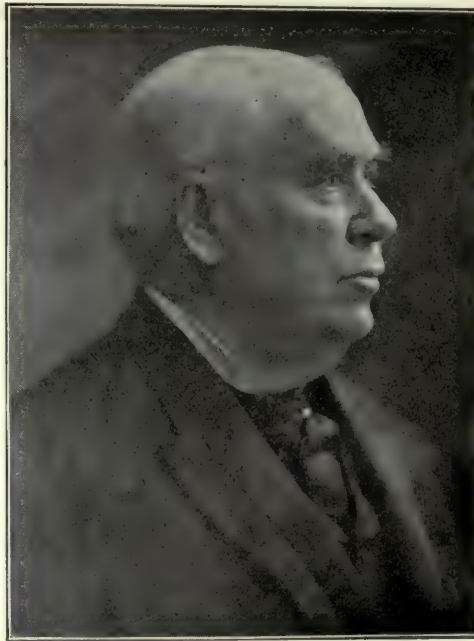

He was educated at St. Francois Xavier College, Antigonish, N. S.



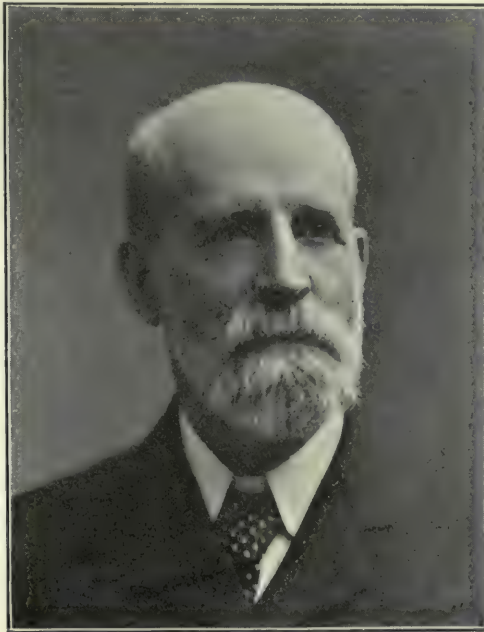

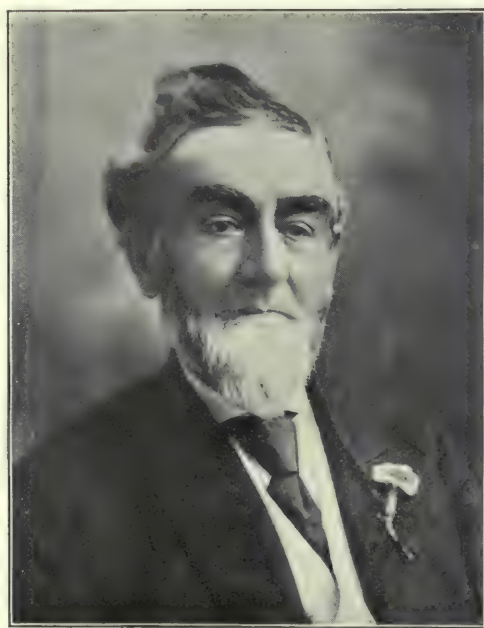

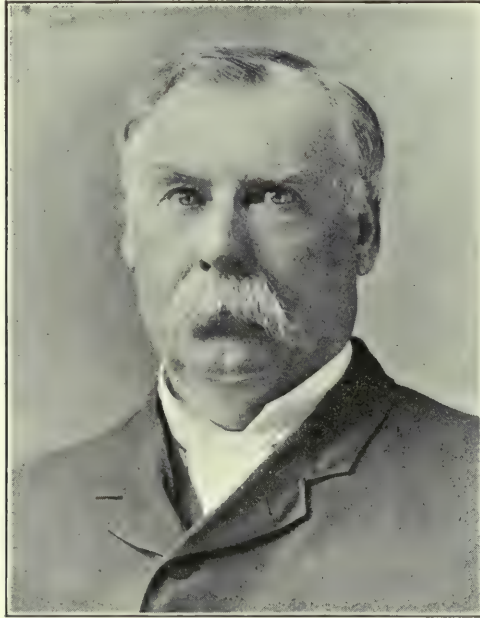

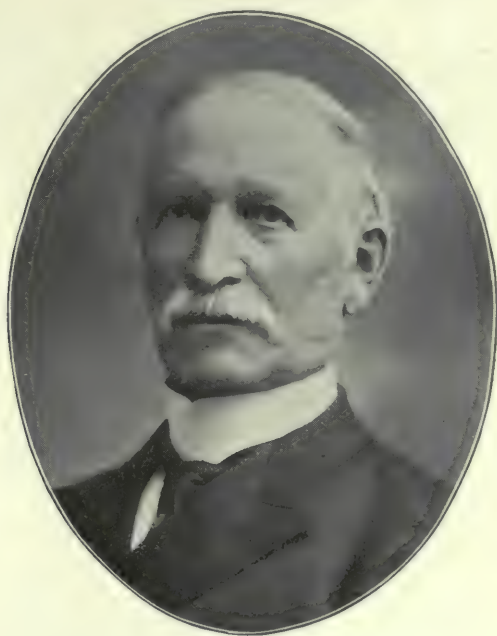

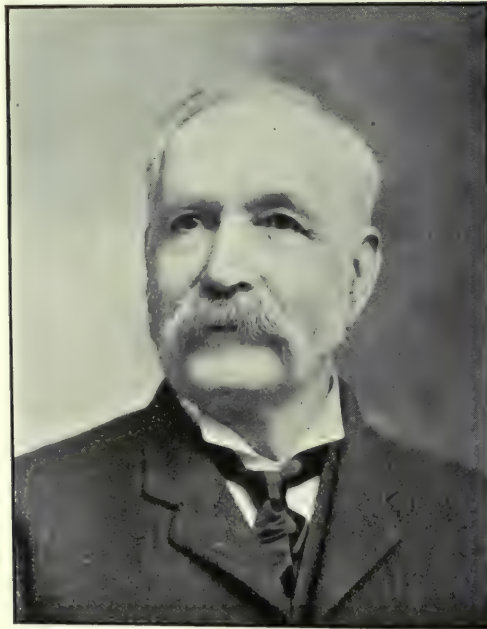

Hon. Lawrence Geoffrey Power was born at Halifax, N.S. on August 9, 1841. He was educated at St. Mary's College, Halifax, Carlow College, the Catholic University, Ireland, and Harvard Law School, Cambridge, Mass., where he received the degree of LL.B. in 1866. He was married on June 23, 1880, to Susan, daughter of Mr. M. O'Leary, of West Quoddy.

He was admitted to the Bar of Nova Scotia in 1866.

He was an Alderman of the City of Halifax for six years and a member of the Board of School Commissioners for thirteen years.

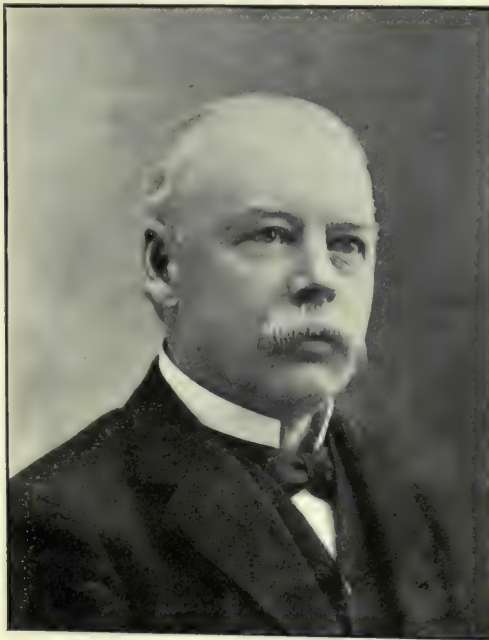


HON. J. E. ROBERTSON.

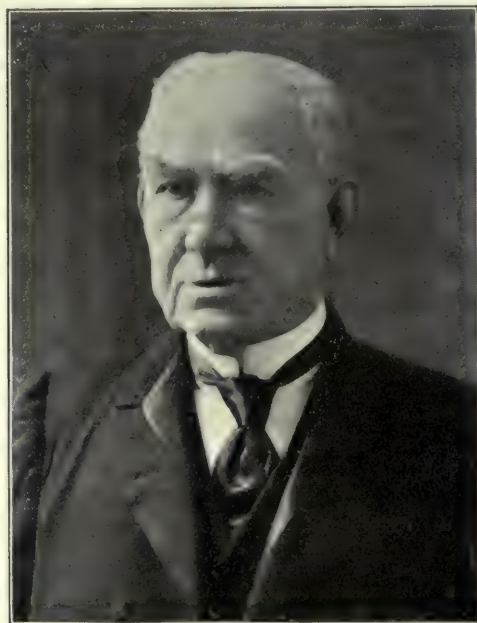

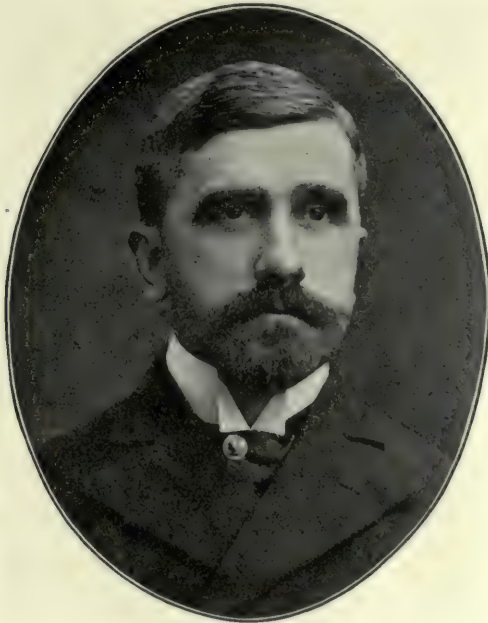
He unsuccessfully contested Victoria for the House of Commons in the Liberal interest, at the general elections of 1891.

Hon. Mr. Roy was married in 1900 to Miss Helen Young, daughter of



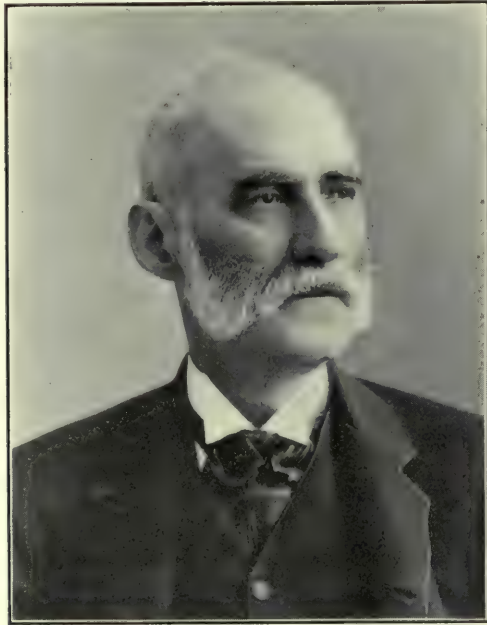

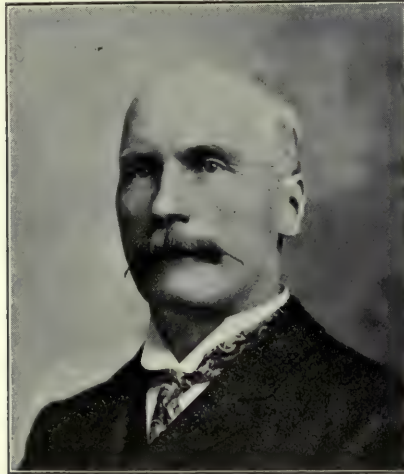
of Surgeons and Physicians in affiliation with Queen's University, he was appointed Professor of Anatomy.

He was married in 1882 to Miss Françoise Mathilde Barnard.

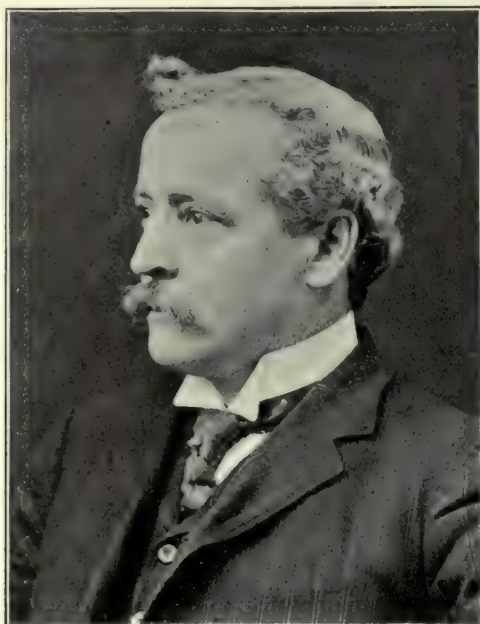
He was elected for the Legislature for Portneuf, at the general elections of 1886, 1890, 1892, 1897 and 1900.

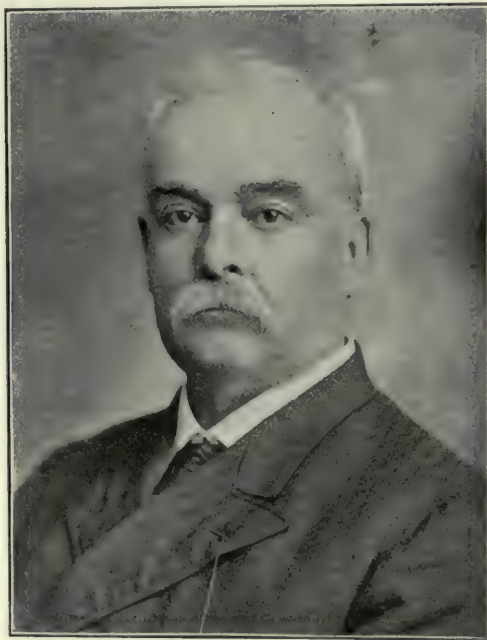

(Fredericton, N.B.)

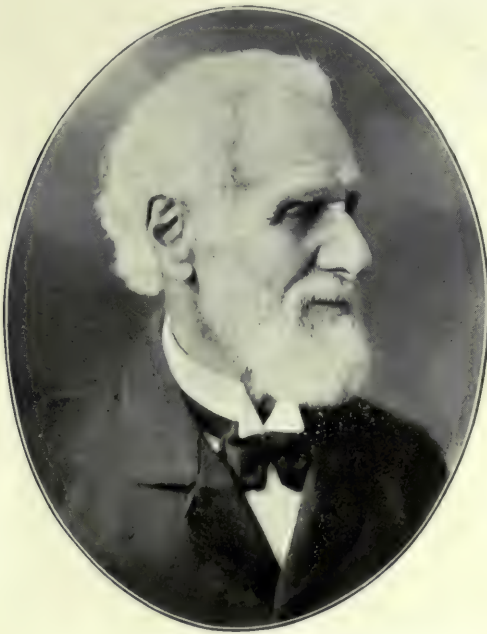
He was a member of the York County Council for six years and Warden three years.

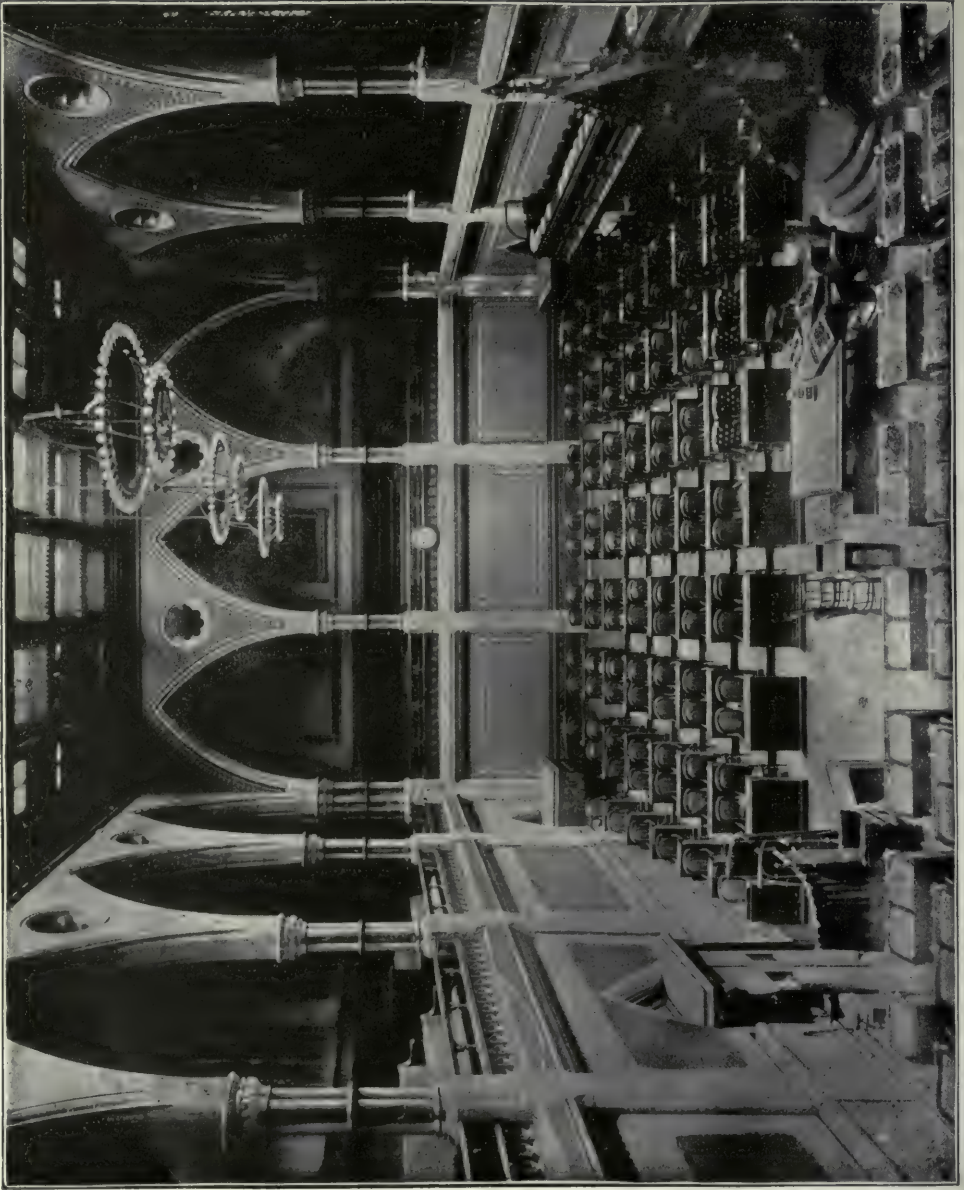

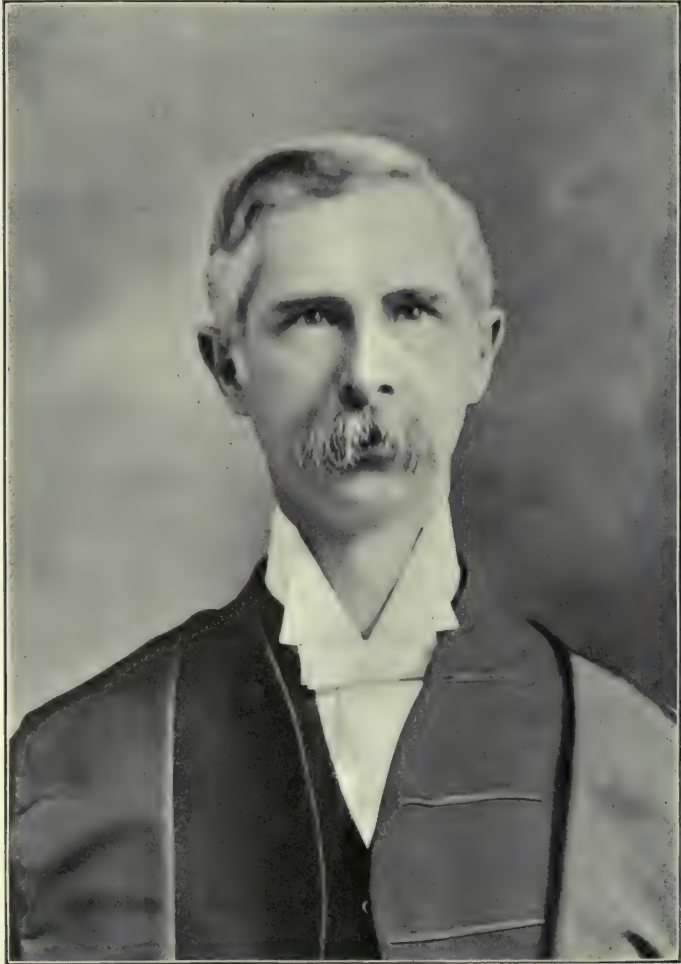


INTERIOR OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.



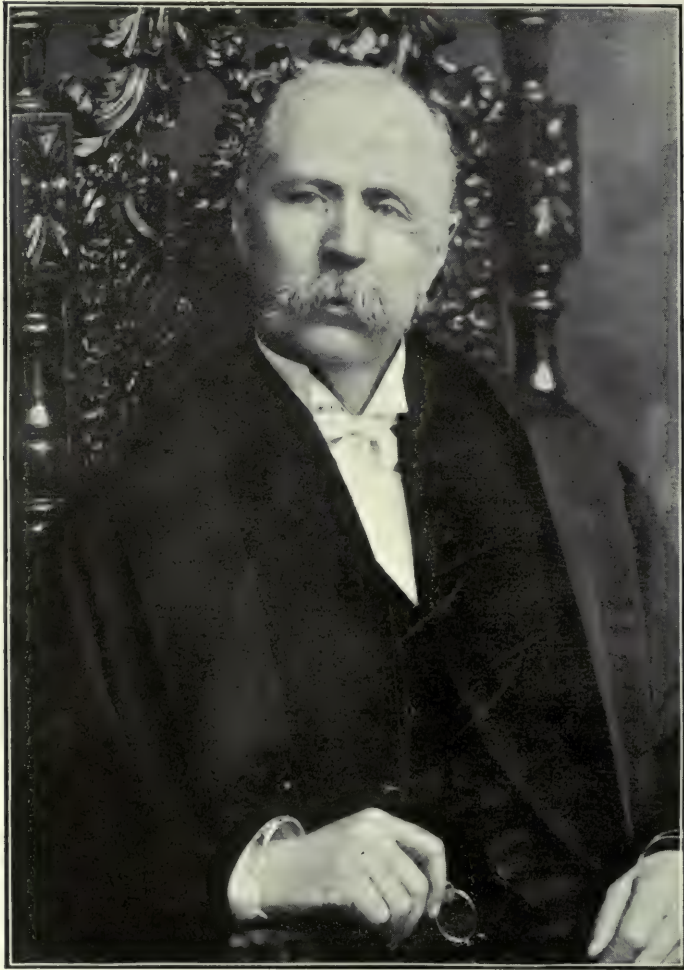

He is Lieut.-Col. of the 14th P.W.O. Rifles.

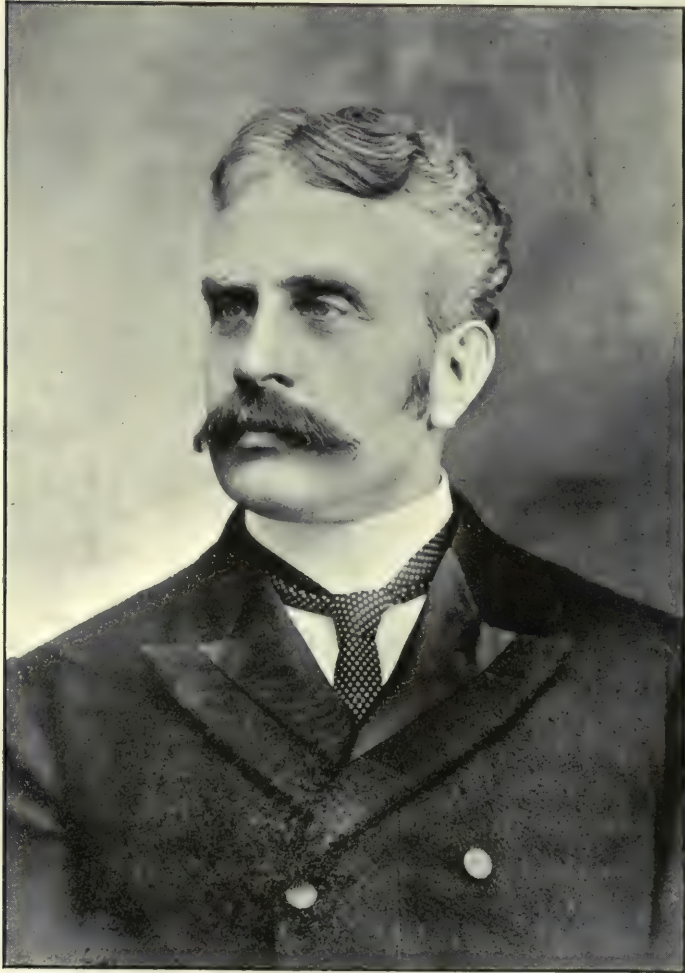
He was married on August 7, 1887, to Mary Barron, widow of the late Major Barron. He was created a Companion of the Imperial Service Order in 1904.

Since 1882, he has been one of the Examiners for the Civil Service. He was formerly President of the Club Cartier at Montreal and edited *L'Opinion Publique* the e in 1881-83. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and has received the degree of Lit-D. from Laval University, and, from the French Government the honorary distinction of Officer de l'Instruction Publique, in 1896. Among his writings are: "Persécutions et Réparations," (1881), "Une Paroisse Canadienne au XVIIe siècle" (1882), "Oscar Dunn" (1886), "Notre Avenir" (1887), "La Crise du Régime Parlementaire" (1886), "Notre Conquête de la Liberté en France et au Canada" (1890), "L'Hon Juge Routhier" (1890), "Sir Alexandre Lacoste" (1891), "L'hon. (Simcoe East.)

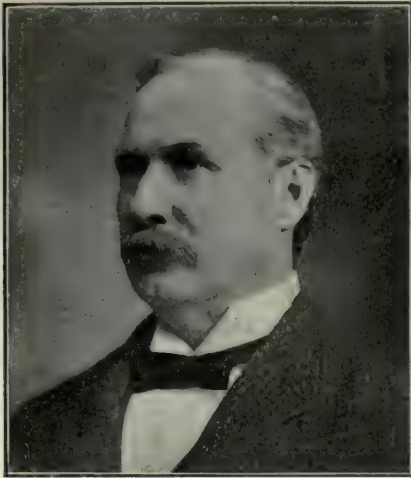

He was first returned at the general elections of 1887; re-elected in 1891, 1896, 1900 and 1904. He was appointed Minister of Militia in the Tupper Administration on May 1, 1896, and retired with the Government on July 8, 1896. He is President of the St. Clair and Erie Ship Canal. He was Chairman of the Standing Committee on Railways and Canals of the House of Commons from 1891 to 1896. He was married in November 1858 to Miss Sarah Araminta Walker. He is an Anglican and a Conservative.—Simcoe, O.

(Richmond and Wolfe, Que.)

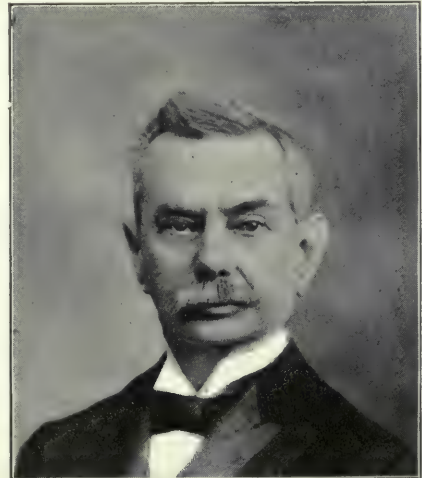
Mr. Edmund William Tobin was born at Brompton Falls, Quebec, on September 14, 1865. He was educated at a Public School. He is a General Merchant and Lumberman. He is President of the Lotbinière Lumber Company, of Lester, Que.; President of the Trois-Pistoles Pulp Company; Director of the Brompton Falls Pulp Paper Company; Director of the Sherbrooke, Quebec,

Lumber Company and Director of the Richmond & Drummond Insurance Company. He was Warden of the County of Richmond in 1897-98 and Mayor of Brompton Falls. He was also a School Commissioner. First returned to Parliament at the general elections of 1900 by a majority of 996, and re-elected in 1904 by one of 1247. A Liberal.—Bathurst, N.B.

Mr. John Gillanders Turriff was born at Little Metis, Que., on December 14, 1853. He was educated there and in Montreal. Mr. Henry Alfred Ward was born at Port Hope, Ontario, on August 20, 1849. He was educated at the Public Schools of his native place. He is a Barrister. He was married on July 15, 1895, to Miss Annie B. Goodwin, of Savannah, Georgia. He was elected Mayor of Port Hope in 1885, 1893 and 1894. He was first returned to the House of Commons at a bye-election held on August 24, 1885, on the death of Col. Williams; re-elected

at the general elections of 1897, 1900 and 1904. He belongs to the Church of England and is a Conservative.— Port Hope, Ont.

R. J. WATSON,
(Parry Sound.)

Mr. Robert James Watson was born at St. John, New-Brunswick, on February 23, 1846. He was educated at a Public School and Hamilton University. He is by occupation a Farmer. He was married on April 23, 1878, to Miss Carrie Schoby. He was first returned to the House of Commons at the general elections of 1904. It was the first time in twenty-six years that Parry Sound elected a Liberal member for the Dominion Parliament. He is interested in a large tannery and owns a line of Steamboats on the Ahmic Lakes. He ran unsuccessfully in Muskoka and Parry Sound for the Commons in 1900. He is a Presbyterian.— Burks Falls, Ont.

(Renfrew N.)

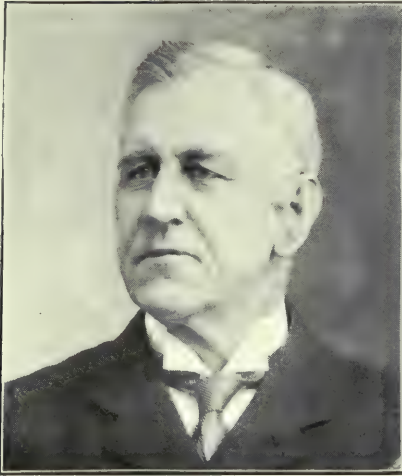

Mr. Robert Duncan Wilmot was in Liverpool, England, in 1837. He was educated in St. John and the Sunbury County Grammar School. He was married in 1867 to Elizabeth W., daughter of B. E. Black, of Halifax, N.S. He has been a member of the Sunbury Municipal Council and Warden of the County. He ran unsuccessfully for the House of Commons in 1886. He was first returned in 1887; re-elected in

1891; defeated in 1896; elected in 1900; re-elected in 1904. He favors the consolidation of Imperial and Colonial interests. He is an Anglican and a Conservative.—Oromocto, N.B.

N. F. WILSON,
(Russell.)

Mr. Norman Frank Wilson was born at Cumberland, Ontario, on September 5, 1876. He was educated at the Public School of his native place, Upper Canada College, Toronto, and the Agricultural College, of Guelph. He is by occupation a farmer. He is Vice-President of the Russell County Agricultural Society and President of the Cumberland Township Agricultural Society.



He was first returned to the House of Commons at the general elections of 1904. He is a Presbyterian and a Liberal.—Cumberland, Ont.



URIAH WILSON,

(Lennox.)

Mr. Uriah Wilson was born at North Fredricksburg, County of Lennox and Addington, Ontario, on March 17, 1841. He was educated at the Napanee Public School. He is a Merchant. (St. John and Iberville, Que.)

Mr. Joseph Demers was born at Henryville, Que., in 1871. He is the son of the late Alexis Demers, former M.L.A. for Iberville, and the brother of Mr. Philippe (now Mr. Justice) Demers, who sat in the House of Commons from 1900 to 1906 when he was appointed to the Bench. He was educated at the College of St. Hyacinthe and St. Mary's College, Montreal. He is a Barrister. He was married in 1896 to Miss Bertha Gravel. He lived for some time in DeLorimier, near Montreal, and was attorney for that town. He was first returned to Parliament at a bye-election held on October 16, 1906, to replace his brother. (Strathcona.)

Mr. Wilburt McIntyre was first returned to the House of Commons at a bye-election held in 1905, after the appointment of Mr. Peter Talbot to the Senate. He is a Physician and Surgeon. He has held several positions of trust and took an active part in all political campaigns of his county for the past



few years. Dr. McIntyre is very popular in the Canadian Parliament. He belongs to the Liberal Party.—Strathcona, Alta.



LORENZO ROBITAILLE,

(Quebec.)

Mr. Lorenzo Robitaille was born at Beauport, Quebec County, on the 27th of May 1882. He is the son of Mr. Alfred Robitaille and his wife Miss Lynotte. (Huron W.)

Mr. Edward Norman Lewis was born at Goderich, Ontario, on September 15, 1856. He is the son of Ira Lewis and Julia L. Welsh, his wife. He is a Barrister. He was married on November 9, 1897, to Ida Howard Shaw. He has been Mayor of Goderich, Acting Crown Attorney and Clerk of the Peace for Huron County. He was first returned to the House of Commons at the general elections of 1904. He is an Anglican and a Conservative.—Goderich, Ont.

A. C. MACDONELL
(Toronto S.)

Mr. Angus Claude Macdonell is the son of Angus Duncan Macdonell, Scotch descent, and his wife, Pauline Rosalie De La Haye, French descent, both Canadian born. He was born at Toronto, on June 23, 1861, and educated at Private Academies and the Toronto Model School. He is a D.C.L. of Trinity University. A Barrister-at-Law. Unmarried. Mr Macdonell is Secretary of the Ontario Liberal-Conservative Association; President of the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen and Vice-President of the Argonaut Rowing Club. He was first elected to the House of Commons at the general elections of 1904. A Roman Catholic and a Conservative.—Toronto.

THOMAS MARTIN,
(Wellington N.)

Mr. Thomas Martin was born at Fergus, Ontario, on May 21, 1850. He is the son of John Martin and Jane Munro, his wife, both of Scotland. He was educated at Mount Forest. He was married on August 21, 1878, to Miss Jane W. Henderson. He is by occupation a Miller. He has been a Councillor and Mayor of Mount Forest. He was first elected to the House of Commons at the general elections of 1904. He is a Presbyterian and a Liberal.—Mount Forest, Ont.



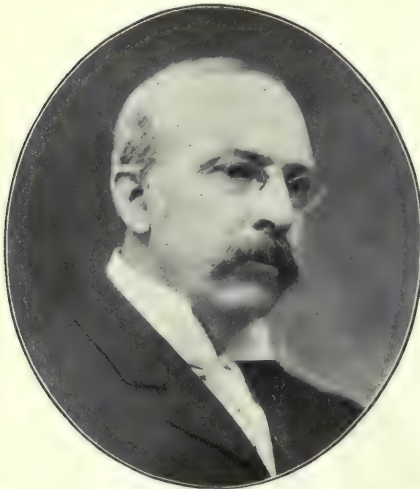
HON. SIR WILLIAM MULOCK.

The Hon. Sir William Mulock was born in the Village of Bond Head, Township of Gwillenbury, County of Simcoe, Ontario, on January 19, 1843. He is the second son of the late Thomas Homan Mulock, M. D., of King's County, Ireland, and Mary, daughter of the late John Cawthra, formerly of Yorkshire, England, who settled in Newmarket, County of York, and was Reform Member in the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada for Simcoe in 1829. He was educated at the Newmarket Grammar School and at the University of Toronto where he graduated in Arts in 1863. He was called to the Bar of Ontario in 1868. He was married on May 25, 1870, to Sarah Ellen Cawthra, daughter of James Crowther, of Toronto. He was appointed Q. C. by the Ontario Government in 1890. He was elected a Member of the Senate of the University of Toronto in 1873 and 1878, and Vice-Chancellor in 1881. He was for several years one of the Examiners in and Lecturer on Equity for the Law Society of Upper Canada. He was first returned to Parliament at the general elections of 1882; re-elected in 1887, 1891, 1896, 1900 and 1904. He was sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Postmaster-General on July 13, 1896. He kept that position until the month of July, 1906, when he resigned owing to ill-health and was appointed Chief Justice of the Exchequer Court of the Province of Ontario. He was knighted in June, 1902. He is an Anglican and was a Liberal.—Toronto.

HON. F. N. YOUNG,

(Killarney)

Hon. Finlay McNaughton Young was born in Chateauguay, Que., in 1852. He is the son of Duncan Young, of St. Chrysostôme, Chateauguay County. He was educated at St. Chrysostôme and Montreal. In 1879, he moved to Manitoba. He is by occupation a farmer. He was first elected to the Local Legislature in 1883 and re-elected at all the subsequent elections up to 1899. In 1899, he was defeated. He was Speaker of the Manitoba Legislature from 1895 to 1899. He was appointed to the Senate on January 30, 1900. He is a Liberal.—Killarney, Man.



ADAM ZIMMERMAN,

(Hamilton W.)

Mr. Adam Zimmerman was born at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, on August 14, 1852. He is the son of Isaac and Ottellia Zimmerman, German-Americans. He was educated at Delaware, Ohio. He is by occupation a Merchant. He was married in 1878 to Miss Bella Campbell. He was first returned to Parliament at the general elections of 1904. He was for ten years on the

Board of Education and is now the Chairman of it. He is also a Licence Commissioner of the City of Hamilton since 14 years. He is a Presbyterian and a Liberal.—Hamilton, Ont.

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ERRATA.

The author of this book begs the indulgence of the reader for a few unimportant errors. One will readily understand how difficult it is to gather all the information required to write the biographies of public men who live in all parts of this extensive Dominion.

In the biography of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the mention of the conferring of a D.C.L. on the Premier by Oxford and Cambridge Universities was omitted.

Under the photogravure of Sir Richard Cartwright, the title of "Right Honorable" is not given by a mistake.

Some of the honorable gentlemen are styled as Q. C.'s whilst they are actually K. C.'s.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux is a Professor of Law at Laval University, besides being a lecturer. He is also a member of the National Liberal Club, of London, England, and he represented the Dominion in several important cases before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.

The birthday of Hon. Hewitt Bostock is May 31, 1864, and not 1844; that of Mr. E. N. Lewis is September 15, 1858, instead of 1856. Mr. Lewis was married in 1887 instead of 1897, and the name of Mrs. Lewis is Julia L. *Dwight*, not *Welsh*.

The date of the bye-election at which Dr. Wilbert McIntyre was elected to Parliament is April 5, 1906.

Mr. J. Tolmie was elected in North Bruce on October 30, 1906, by a majority of about 350. He was born on August 31, 1845, at Laggan, Inverness-shire, Scotland. He is a Manufacturer and sat in the House of Commons for West Bruce from 1896 to 1900.

There have been changes in the cabinet since the first pages of the book were printed.

The late Hon. R. Prefontaine was replaced by Hon. L. P. Brodeur; Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick became Chief Justice of Canada and was replaced at the head of the Department of Justice by Hon. Mr. Aylesworth to whom Hon. Mr. Lemieux succeeded. Hon. Mr. Templeman became Minister of Inland Revenue.

The publication of this book has been delayed by the difficulty we had in securing some photographs, but it is brought up to the Queen's-Shelburne bye-election on October 31, 1906, when Hon. Mr. Fielding was elected by a majority of 992 over Prof. Weldon.



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
